As Kenya phases out the 8-4-4 education system, the government has implemented critical reforms to ensure the successful adoption of the Competency-Based Curriculum (CBC).

The final Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education (KCSE) exams are set to be administered in 2027, marking the full transition to the CBC system.

In light of these changes, the government has shown unwavering support for the teams driving these transformative education reforms, which are tailored to address current challenges and lay a solid foundation for a robust CBC framework.

Speaking at a media briefing in Nairobi, Government Spokesperson Dr.

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State allocates Sh500m to expand and upgrade Huduma Centres to improve service delivery

The Government will allocate Sh500 million in the 2025/2026 financial year budget to build more Huduma Centres, upgrade deteriorating ones, and modernize equipment.

The Principal Secretary for the State Department for Public Service, Amos Gathecha, stated that the move aims to expand service delivery, ensure operational efficiency, and address existing gaps.

Speaking during the

second annual Huduma Centre managers' conference held at the Kenya School of Government (KSG) Mombasa Campus, the PS highlighted that the government is implementing austerity measures in budget execution.

He encouraged the managers to adopt a "doing more with less" approach and devise creative and innovative solutions to bridge resource gaps.

"Huduma Centres have played a key role in improving the image of the government. These centres

are places where members of the public can comfortably access all the services they need. Of course, as with any institution, there are occasionally a few challenges, but whenever we detect any issues, we take swift action," Gathecha said.

The conference provided a platform to review successes and challenges, identify areas for improvement and collaboration, and strategize on actualizing Huduma Kenya's mandate of transforming public service by ensuring access

to efficient, effective, dignified, and citizen-centric services.

"Our goal is to enhance the customer experience, ensuring all our customers leave our platforms with a smile, in line with the theme of this conference, 'Service with a Smile,'" he emphasized.

"One key pillar of the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) is providing government services online. In August 2023, during

Isaac Mwaura stated that the academic calendar for the transition to Junior Secondary School has commenced, with the first cohort of CBC learners joining Grade 9. This marks a critical milestone in the CBC system.

The learners are set to transition to Grade 10 in 2026, where senior schools will offer three distinct pathways: Social Sciences; STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics); and the Arts and Sports, according to Dr. Mwaura.

He added that the reforms highlight the government's commitment to a seamless implementation of the CBC system.

"To support this transition, the government has constructed 14,500 classrooms out of the targeted 16,000. This has been made possible through the disbursement of Sh. 11b to schools, alongside an additional Sh. 6.8 billion allocated to the National Government-Constituency

Development Fund. To accommodate increased enrollment and ensure a smooth transition for the CBC cohort, an additional 7,290 classrooms will also be constructed," said Dr. Mwaura. He also revealed that the government is actively addressing teacher shortages to further support the transition to the CBC system.

Dr. Mwaura stated that the government has employed 56,000 permanent and pensionable teachers and 20,000 interns to reinforce the education workforce, while an additional 8,707 teachers have been replaced to ensure continuity in learning.

To further enhance the transition to CBC, he disclosed that the state plans to employ another 6,000 teachers in due course. "These efforts

demonstrate our commitment to providing quality education and adequate staffing for a seamless implementation of the curriculum. We aim to ensure every Kenyan child is taught by well-trained educators and has access to a healthy learning environment," Mwaura affirmed. Furthermore, Dr. Mwaura said the Ministry of Education, in collaboration with the National Treasury, is facilitating the timely disbursement of Sh. 48 billion in capitation grants for primary and junior secondary schools for the first term of 2025 to ensure uninterrupted learning.

Additionally, he noted that the Ministry of Education had procured 9,926,618 textbooks for Grade 9 learners, which have already been distributed to schools.

"To ensure all learners have access to the required materials, the Kenya Institute of Curriculum Development (KICD) has been directed to ensure that textbooks and instructional materi-

als are adequately available in all schools," said Dr. Mwaura.

Meanwhile, with the release of the 2024 KCSE results, Dr. Mwaura mentioned that the government has introduced a mid-year KCSE exam series starting in July 2025.

This initiative, according to the Government Spokesperson, is designed to support students who wish to retake the exams or those who may have missed them due to illness or hardship, ensuring a smooth transition during the remaining years of the 8-4-4 system. "Additionally, efforts are underway to integrate orbit readers and gradually phase out braille machines for candidates with visual impairments, demonstrating the government's commitment to inclusivity," he said. On another note, Dr. Mwaura highlighted concerns regarding the reintroduction of banned levies in some senior schools, warning that action would be taken against those found culpable.

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the first conference, the government had just launched the eCitizen platform with 5,000 services.

Today, this platform offers over 20,000 online services," Gathecha added.

Huduma Kenya operates through four platforms: the 57 physical centres represented at the conference, Huduma Mashinani Outreach (the most common platform), the Huduma Contact Centre, and the Huduma e-platforms.

Collectively, these platforms employ 2,600 staff members, serving an average of 28,000 customers daily across the country. As of December 31, 2024, the Huduma Centres had achieved a customer satisfaction rate of 80.8%, a 2% increase from the first quarter.

This achievement presents an opportunity to reflect on strategies to further increase customer satisfaction, aiming for 95% as outlined in the 2024/2025 financial year budget.



PS Muriuki announces committee to address SHA implementation issues

The Government is set to establish a committee to address the challenges Kenyans face in accessing services from the Social Health Authority (SHA), Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards Mary Muriuki has announced.

Ms. Muriuki acknowledged that while the government has made significant progress in rolling out SHA, it is still grappling with challenges hindering the full implementation of the medical scheme.

According to the PS, the special committee will, among other tasks, address the benefit package. She noted that the package has drawn sharp criticism from Kenyans, who are calling for a review to align the benefits with the deductions being remitted to the scheme.

“We have challenges with SHA. This is a project where we have achieved 100 per cent rollout, but that doesn’t mean the government is sitting back and moving on. We are

working to resolve the issues so we can address the concerns of those saying SHA is paying very little of the medical bills,” she said.

The PS spoke in Othaya, Nyeri during the launch of a medical camp which was organized by the Chinga Member of County Assembly, Kiruga Thuku in collaboration with the Chronic Disease Society Africa and the County Government of Nyeri.

During the medical camp, residents of Chinga

benefited from free cancer awareness and screening as well as screening for none communicable diseases such as arthritis, diabetes and hypertension.

The medical camp also provided an opportunity for the Community Health Promoters to offer training and register the participants to SHA with the PS noting that so far more than 18.2 million Kenyans have been enlisted.

She said that in addition to the enhanced packages, the Social Health Insur-

ance Fund (SHIF) will provide additional services that were not previously covered under the National Health Insurance Fund.

“We have enhanced the packages to ensure they have more funds to cover areas that no insurance cover used to cater for such as optics and dental. You may complain that the money is little but it was not there before,” she stated

At the same time, the PS also cautioned elected leaders from politicizing the medical scheme and challenged them to use their capacity as leaders to encourage Kenyans to register and start enjoying the enhanced medical cover.

“As leaders we must never politicize health. We must also distance ourselves from anything that will jeopardize a program that is helping the people. We should tell the people that if they register for SHA there is a guarantee that if they follow the correct referral system and visit the right medical facility, they will receive treatment,” stated the PS.

Murang’a to fund fees for top students in day schools across county

The Murang’a County Government has launched the Inua Masomo program for this year. This initiative covers school fees for the top ten students in each class at all day secondary schools within the county.

Speaking at the program’s launch at Kiria-ini Girls High School, Governor Irungu Kang’ata stated that the program will cover term one fees for the top ten students in Forms 2, 3, and 4 at day schools across the county.

The Governor explained that this approach will enhance transitions to high school and boost academic success in day schools. It also shifts the decision-making power for bursaries from the government to the students.

“The top students will be picked each term consequently encouraging competi-

tion amongst students every term,” he said.

According to Kang’ata the program fosters transparency in the bursary issuing process and also strengthens the local economy by retaining the education funds within the county.

The Inua Masomo initiative helps over 7,000 students stay in school every term by covering their fees completely. It recruits new beneficiaries regularly to support this goal. Moreover, the program seeks to make education accessible by supporting vulnerable students while at the same time encouraging competition by rewarding top performers.

The county will also continue to give bursaries to boarding school students who were beneficiaries under the Nyota Zetu program, started by the previous governor, Mwangi wa Iria.

Kenya signs landmark deal with UAE to drive growth, innovation

The Government of Kenya has reiterated its commitment to delivering the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (THE BETA PLAN) to unlock economic opportunities, attract investments, and improve livelihoods for all Kenyans through the signing of the Kenya-UAE Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA).

This transformative agreement is the first of its kind between the UAE and a mainland African nation, cementing Kenya's position as the gateway to East and Southern Africa while enhancing trade, investment, and technological cooperation.

This commitment by the government has led to Kenya emerging as a global leader in startup funding, attracting \$638 million in 2024, which represents 29 percent of Africa's total startup funding, according to The Big Deal Africa.

Furthermore, this surge is supported by innovative government initiatives, such as the Digital Super-highway program under THE BETA PLAN, which aims to connect every corner of the country. The program is backed by a Sh53 billion fund from the World Bank, designated for the construction of 100,000 kilometers of broadband fiber optic infrastructure.

Additionally, the pro-

posed Startup Act seeks to foster innovation and entrepreneurship. Speaking in Nairobi during a media briefing, the Government Spokesperson Dr. Isaac Mwaura stated that the CEPA will expand access to UAE markets for Kenyan goods, including agricultural exports such as meat, fruits, vegetables and flowers, which support millions of Kenyan farmers, thereby boosting trade and livelihoods.

"For instance, in 2023, Kenya exported Sh9.9 billion worth of meat and Sh10.8 billion in fruits and

vegetables to the UAE," he exemplified, insisting that this agreement is expected to double these figures by eliminating trade barriers and simplifying customs processes. On Job Creation and Innovation as Kenya's startup ecosystem captures 32 percent of Africa's funding in the first half of 2024, the Government Spokesperson mentioned that this influx of capital is fueling job creation and driving innovation across sectors like fintech, climate tech, and digital services, addressing local challenges while creating sustainable employment opportunities.

Additionally, he pointed out that the Jobs Majuu Initiative, which connects skilled Kenyans to

employment opportunities abroad, complements this effort by providing an international platform for Kenyan professionals and ensuring they benefit from global networks and investments.

He at the same time said that the CEPA goes beyond trade in goods, unlocking new markets for Kenyan service providers in education, transport, construction, and ICT. It also paves the way for technology transfer and collaboration, positioning Kenyan businesses to compete globally.

Further, Dr. Mwaura highlighted that the CEPA provides the UAE with investment opportunities in critical sectors like energy, water, health, and ICT, aligning with Kenya's strategy to reduce borrowing while fostering public-private partnerships and foreign direct investments.

"Both nations have also committed to promoting clean technologies and environmentally responsible practices, ensuring that economic growth is achieved sustainably and benefits future generations," noted Dr. Mwaura.

Mwaura maintained that through the BETA, Kenya is positioning itself as a global trade partner, offering premium products and services while embracing innovation and sustainable development.

Value of meat Kenya exported to UAE markets in 2023 under previous deal

Kenyans urged to vaccinate their Livestock to boost meat exports

The State Department of Livestock Development held a meeting with all the County Directors of Veterinary Services (CDVS), the Council of Governors (COGs), and the County Executive Committees (CECs) in charge of livestock to plan for the national vaccination campaign of livestock against Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) and Peste des Petits Ruminants (PPR).

The meeting focused on key issues affecting the veterinary sector, with an emphasis on improving service delivery and addressing challenges faced by all the counties.

Speaking in Nairobi, Principal Secretary (PS) for Livestock Development Jonathan Mueke unveiled an ambitious plan to commercialize the livestock industry, aimed at elevating Kenya's economy and bridging the gap between the rich and the poor.

He further empha-

sized the critical role of dairy, meat, and leather industries in boosting the country's economic standing, while outlining a comprehensive strategy to achieve these goals.

The PS highlighted five primary areas of focus for improving the livestock sector including Breed Improvement which enhances genetic quality to increase productivity and resilience in livestock, Animal Feed which addresses the availability and quality of feed to ensure optimal growth and health and Disease Control which urges farmers to embrace vaccination and ultimately strengthen vaccination programs and veterinary services.

Others include Animal Identification which implements robust tracking systems (digital ID) to improve traceability that comply with international standards; and Livestock Master Plan which develops a structured roadmap to guide the sector's growth and align it with national development goals.

However, Mueke expressed concern about Kenya's meat exports losing value due to inadequate vaccination and health certifications.

He noted that Kenyan meat is sold at lower prices in international markets of Dubai and Saudi Arabia compared to meat products of other countries.

Wajir secures crucial medical supplies from US-based donor

"The establishment of this unit will reduce referrals and lessen the financial burden on our people, who previously had to travel long distances for critical medical services," the governor said.

The Communications Authority of Kenya (CA), is the regulatory agency for the ICT industry in Kenya with responsibilities in telecommunications, e-commerce, broadcasting and postal/courier services. CA is also responsible for managing the country's numbering and frequency spectrum resources, managing and administering the Universal Service Fund (USF) as well as safeguarding the interests of consumers of ICT services.

The Kenya Information and Communications Act, 1998 (as amended) mandates the Authority to licence and regulate broadcasting services in Kenya. In furtherance of the responsibility of promoting and facilitating the development of a diverse range of broadcasting services in Kenya in keeping with the public interest as provided for under Section 46A (a) of the Act, the Authority has proposed guidelines on implementation of the harmonization of the identification of channels in Digital Terrestrial Television (DTT) Networks that will result in channel sorting being done using Logical Channel Number (LCN) descriptor instead of the current provision of Programme Service Indicator/Service Indicator.

The implementation of Digital Video Broadcasting (DVB) identifiers has the advantage of providing consumers with ease of access to DTT content as well as enabling broadcast signal distributors and broadcasters to prioritize broadcasting services.

The guidelines detail the requirements for the adoption and use of Original Network identification, Network Identities and Logical Channel Numbers (LCNs) in Kenya. It also provides guidance to the Broadcast service providers that will assist them in providing the correct details in the application forms for LCNs.

The objective of this consultation on guidelines on implementation of DVB identifiers and logical channel numbers is to allow stakeholders and the public provide feedback and suggestions on improvement of the proposed guidelines.

ICT Ministry to oversee integration of systems across state departments

The Ministry of Information, Communications, and the Digital Economy is committed to realizing the full digitalization of government manual records, a move that will enhance service delivery and boost economic growth.

The Ministry's Cabinet Secretary, William Kabogo, emphasized the need for a whole-of-government approach to fully achieve the digitalization agenda. He pledged that the ministry will take a leading role, given that ICT is a key enabler for all ministries and agencies.

Speaking during a meeting with heads of departments and divisions

from the State Department of ICT, the Cabinet Secretary urged ministries and departments to digitize their manual records, automate backend processes, and integrate systems to eliminate reliance on manual records.

"In the past, ministries have worked in silos during the digitalization process. As the ministry responsible for ICT, we will strictly adhere to the established guidelines and coordinate a whole-of-government approach," Kabogo stated.

The CS said that he wants to have the government fully digitized by the time he leaves office as he gave a 90 days' timeline for the ministry to go paperless in its communication that is letters, memos among others.

Kabogo emphasized that digitalization of government operations will

corruption.


"If you can digitize government services from A-Z, the Controller of Budget and Auditor General will be able to pick information from counties and the national government as it is happening and they will be able to compare your plan of expenditure with your available budget and this will help deal with the issue of pending bills," said Kabogo.

He continued: "As a ministry in charge of leading the digitalization of government, we also want to lead in the fight against corruption and I am proposing that we have a trophy for people who fight corruption and it is visible in their work in the ministry so that we can reward them," said Kabogo.

Under the Ministry of Lands digitization programme, Kabogo said that so far a total of Sh3.9 billion has been spent on digitization of records where documents have been scanned as he called for full migration into the digital system to avoid the production of new physical records.

State Department for ICT and Digital Economy Principal Secretary (PS) Eng. John Tanui said that the ICT is critical in the overall performance of the government since the other sectors cannot deliver without the ministry's support in terms of connectivity and provision of operational platforms.

According to Tanui, the digital economy is expanding rapidly, recording a growth rate 2.5 times faster than the physical economy as he explained that the ministry is working to support the sector with systems that can handle challenges like cybersecurity, misinformation, disinformation among others.

Kilifi invests Sh2.5 billion in water infrastructure with World Bank support

The Kilifi County Government, in partnership with the World Bank, is implementing water reticulation projects worth Sh2.58 billion, according to Governor Gideon Mung'aro. The Governor stated that his administration, with the support of the international lender, is undertaking significant water projects in Malindi, Kilifi, and Mtwapa towns to enhance water reticulation by replacing old pipelines with new ones. "We have invested Sh580 million in Kilifi town, Sh1.2 billion in Malindi, and Sh800 million in Mtwapa for water reticulation," he said. Governor Mung'aro also mentioned that his

administration is constructing a Sh200 million, 5-million-litre water tank in Mtepeni Ward, and another 2.5-million-litre water tank in Buni, Rabai, at a cost of about Sh90 million. Additionally, a 32-kilometre pipeline is being laid within Kilifi town. "We are doing this so that even during water rationing, people will continue to have water from the storage facilities. For instance, if we ration water for four days per week, the five million-litre water tank will be able to supply water for the remaining days," he explained. Mung'aro spoke in Kilifi town while responding to allegations that a Sh19 million water project he commis-

sioned on December 23, 2024 in Chamari village, Magarini constituency, had run dry, allegations he refuted. Last week, a section of the media quoted people claiming to be Chamari residents as saying that the area had received water for only two days after the commissioning ceremony before the taps ran dry. The Governor however clarified that water was available on certain days due to an ongoing rationing programme ran by Coast Water Works Development Agency "My role is to set up the necessary infrastructure, which Chamari has not had since independence. Water comes from the Coast Water Works Development Agency, which supplies the water," he said.

Over 900,000 Kenyans access primary healthcare through SHA program

The Government has made significant strides in healthcare, with an even greater resolve to achieve Universal Health Coverage (UHC) for all Kenyans and address global health threats.

Speaking during a press conference at the Ministry of Health Headquarters in Nairobi, Public Health and Professional Standards PS Mary Muriuki highlighted the progress made so far, following the recent implementation of the country’s Social Health Authority (SHA) program, while emphasizing the importance of digitization and community participation.

Pointing out that the program is focused on equitable access for all Kenyans, Muriuki announced that the Taifa Care system, which is already in place in key counties, has reduced the turnaround time for outpatient procedures to just 46 minutes, significantly improving efficiency.

“Since October 2024, 907,853 people have utilized primary healthcare

among SHA members, and claims valued at Sh14.6 billion have been approved,” she revealed.

However, despite this remarkable progress, the PS noted that challenges still remain, including low weekend enrollment and delays caused by dependents being enrolled only at the time of seeking care.

Consequently, Muriuki urged families to update their profiles in a timely manner and called on community health promoters to continue following up with hard-to-reach populations.

At the same time, she commended Kenya’s progress in healthcare, with 18.2 million Kenyans now registered under SHA, marking a milestone in the government’s UHC agenda.

“The system continues to be fully rolled out, making healthcare access easier

tools that register and streamline enrollment,” affirmed Muriuki.

The PS emphasized that every effort by the government is aimed at the dignity and health of every Kenyan, adding that similar sentiments have been echoed by the World Health Organization (WHO) regarding global partnerships, with Kenya being listed as a leading African role model for health resilience. Meanwhile, the Director General (DG) for Health, Dr. Patrick Amoth gave crucial updates on vaccines and Kenya’s readiness against the Marburg Virus Disease.

Dr. Amoth took note of the disease outbreak close to Kenya’s borders with Tanzania, cautioning that the country still remains at high risk due to cross-border movement.

“We commend Kenya for its preparedness plan, but vigilance is critical,” he reiterated.

“Our call to action is that communities are very important in bringing such an outbreak to an end through public mobilization and advocacy to the people,” he rallied.

National Treasury develops legal guidelines for Virtual Assets and providers

As the use of Virtual Assets (VAs) continues to gain momentum among Kenyans, the Ministry of National Treasury and Economic Planning has developed a comprehensive legal and regulatory framework to govern VAs and Virtual Asset Providers (VASPs), ensuring the safety and integrity of Kenya’s financial system.

A VA is a digital representation of value that can be traded or transferred digitally and used for payment or investment purposes.

The draft National Policy on VAs and VASPs Bill, 2024, will provide a framework for the oversight and development of the VA ecosystem.

The policy aims to guide the creation of a legal framework for VAs and VASPs, promote a fair and efficient market for these entities, ensure sound risk management, and foster financial literacy and innovation in the VA and VASP sectors.

The bill also addresses cross-boundary risks associated with VAs, such as money laundering (ML), terrorism financing (TF), proliferation financing (PF), tax evasion, fraud, cybercrime, weak governance, and consumer protection issues.

The Capital Markets Authority and the Central Bank have been designated as the regulatory authorities under the bill. Among other functions, they will be responsible for licensing VASPs, ap-

proving the issuance of an initial VA offering, improving the registration of a scheme involving an initial VA offering, regulating, supervising and monitoring promoters of an initial VA offering and ensuring financial soundness and stability of the financial system in respect of matters falling under the Act.

The sound legal and regulatory framework will catapult the country to be a leading player in the global digital finance ecosystem.

The Principal Secretary for the National Treasury Dr Chris Kiptoo in his speech read by Abednego Marube said the initiative aligns with the government’s commitment to foster financial innovation while ensuring consumer protection, financial stability and prevention of financial crimes.

The rapid growth of VAs, Dr Kiptoo noted presents both opportunities and challenges. The opportunities are new avenues for economic empowerment, financial

inclusion and technological advancement.

The challenges are risks relating to market volatility, consumer protection, and potential misuse for illicit activities.

“Our objective is to strike a balance between innovation and regulation, fostering a safe and dynamic financial ecosystem,” stated the PS during a Public Participation for Mombasa, Kwale, Kilifi, Tana River, Lamu and Taita Taveta counties.

Beatrice Mjomba a resident of Taita Taveta County lauded the development of the draft bill as many people were affected by the proliferation of VAs which were largely unregulated.

For communities to embrace and adopt VAs, Mjomba advises the National Treasury to step up sensitization efforts.

“We saw rich people being rendered money less and becoming very poor to an extent some of them cannot fend for themselves just because of these common businesses in line with VAs,” said Mjomba.

Rice farmers to cut production costs with Lower Nzoia Irrigation Project

Rice farmers under the Bunyala irrigation scheme are set to save on production costs once the Lower Nzoia Irrigation Project (LNIP) is commissioned, according to the Principal Secretary for Irrigation, Ephantus Kimotho.

Kimotho explained that the high electricity bills incurred by the scheme to pump water into the paddy fields would soon be a thing of the past, as farmers would receive water through gravity once LNIP begins operations.

He was speaking in Siaya town during the Lower Nzoia Irrigation Project Aggregators' Conference, which brought together stakeholders from Siaya and Busia counties.

Kimotho, who was accompanied by Siaya County Commissioner Norbert Komora, stated that farmers were expected to increase production due to the reduced operational and maintenance costs.



He added that the savings should be used to invest in more inputs to further boost production.

The PS said the government has incorporated all stakeholders into the planning and execution of the project in a move meant to ensure that

LNIP was a success.

"We want this project to be market-driven hence the meeting with stakeholders," said.

Kimotho said President William Ruto would, on Wednesday, January 22, 2025, inspect the on-going works under phase one and launch phase two that is set to cover 7,500 acres.

Siaya County Executive Committee Member for Agriculture, Sylvester K'okoth, called on the national government to protect local rice farmers from competition with cheap imports as a way of encouraging production.

K'okoth lamented that 75 to 85% of shelf space reserved for rice in supermarkets in the country was taken up by imported rice, leaving the local brands struggling.

"We cannot purport to be supporting our value chains and farmers while we are not protecting them from cheap imports that get into the country," said the CECM.

"We are comforted that the government's Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) is focused in ensuring that we reduce imports on agricultural products that we can do locally."

Addressing the occasion, Busia CECM for agriculture, Dr. George Mkok and his Trade and Cooperatives counterpart, Olakachun Omuse, said the LNIP was going to be a game changer to residents of Siaya and Busia counties who have been relying on rain fed agriculture over the years.

They called on the locals to take advantage of the project to uplift their economic status.

Retirement Benefits Authority clarifies pension deduction hike

The Retirement Benefits Authority (RBA) has sought to clarify the proposed increase in pension deductions for salaried workers, urging Kenyans to view the new rates as an enhanced approach to retirement savings. BA Chief Executive Officer Charles Machira emphasized that the new deductions, set to take effect next month under the National Social Security Fund (NSSF) Act 2013, should not be perceived as a tax but as a savings mechanism to ensure retirees lead dignified lives in their later years. Machira explained that

the Act provides for a phased escalation of contributions by both employers and employees. He highlighted that, under the proposed schedules, contributions would double from the current Ksh 4,320. "I want to encourage members of the labor force. Previously, you were saving Ksh 400 before the NSSF Act 2013. Now, the provision requires you to save Ksh 8,640. This is employee money, with employers contributing 50 percent of that for those earning salaries above Ksh 72,000. For those earning less, the formula can still be applied on a pro-rata basis," Machira said.

The visually impaired in Mandera benefit from digital training program

At least 100 visually impaired individuals in Mandera County have benefited from a 10-day digital training program designed to equip them with the foundational knowledge and practical skills needed to thrive in today's interconnected, technology-driven world.

The training aims to provide individuals with visual impairments the necessary digital skills to independently use digital devices, enabling them to navigate and participate effectively in the expanding digital landscape.

This initiative is particularly timely as the government leads the digitization of its services through the E-Citizen platform to ensure seamless access for all citizens.

The program is implemented by the Kenya Society for the Blind (KSB) in collaboration with the United Kingdom (UK) government and the Kenya ICT Action Network (KICTANet). According to the KSB Executive Director Samson Waweru, tech-

Technology is a catalyst that will help the visually impaired not only to access information and services but also opportunities that come with modern day technologies.

Speaking during the training's closing ceremony, Waweru said that in addition to the training, KSB will provide computers with assistive devices at the Mandera Library where the beneficiaries will be free to visit and ac-

cess online services.

"For a person who is blind, technology is the only bridge that can cure gaps of life and enable us access employment opportunities, become better in our profession, and that's why the UK government and KICTANet have partnered with us so that we are able to carry out this training and equip persons with visually impairment in Mandera with some basic skills in technology," Waweru said.

"We are also going to bring 40 computers here, 10 of which will be installed with assistive software for the blind so that these persons can come to the library and use them to access information and opportunities," he added.

Additionally, the KSB director said that they are going to enable the visually impaired persons to access digital books to read and grow their knowledge.

This is aimed at promoting critical thinking, problem solving and ethical decision-making abilities to enable effective and responsible use of digital tools and platforms.

The Regulations seek to domesticate the global framework for aviation practices including the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), the Standards and Recommended Practices (SARPs), ICAO's Safety Standards, Security Regulations, Environmental Standards, Operational Standards and Procedures, Personnel licensing, Airworthiness Standards, Accident investigation and Protocols, International Cooperation and Passenger rights and Accessibility.

New law sets harsh penalties for violating rights of persons with disabilities

A new law aimed at safeguarding the rights of persons with disabilities has outlined stiff penalties for those found violating its provisions.

Article 61(1) of the Persons with Disabilities Bill 2023 (Bill No. 7 of 2023) states that anyone who willfully and without lawful justification treats a person with a disability in contravention of Article 2794(4) and (5) of the Constitution commits an offence and is liable to a fine not exceeding two million shillings or imprisonment for up to two years.

Among the offences listed are denying these individuals public services or entry into public places accessible to the public, the right to inherit family property, access to health services, education, and the right to obtain, process, and utilize identification documents such as birth certificates, national identity cards, and passports.

Parents, who mete physical violence occasioning actual harm or psychological torture, wrongfully confine or detain a person living with disability to deny such a person opportunities and services as outlined in law shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one million shillings or an imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years.

Article 64. (1) of the Bill also mandates both the National and County governments to take necessary measures necessary to eliminate harmful practices often committed against persons with disabilities such as witchcraft, abandonment, concealment and ritual killings.

Any person who perpetrates such harmful practice against a person with disability commits an offence and shall be liable, on conviction, to life imprisonment.

Medical practitioners have also been prohibited from discriminating against persons with disabilities in the observance of ethical guidelines on informed consent and confidentiality when attending to them.

Health care workers attending to persons with disabilities will from now be obliged to take special care to provide complete information through accessible methods and formats.

Article 67(4) states that any medic who performs a procedure on a person with a disability and which leads to or is likely to lead to infertility commits an offence and is liable upon conviction to a fine of three million shillings or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding four years or both.

The Bill also outlines the publishing, circulating or displaying any publication that lowers or demeans the dignity of a person with disability or which amounts to discrimination.

If convicted under the above offence, one shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one million or serve a term not exceeding six months or both according to Article 68. (3) of the Bill.

In addition, any person who causes harm or death of a person with disability through torture, cruel treatment, ritual killings or other harmful practices commits an offence shall be liable upon conviction to life behind bars.

months or both according to Article 68. (3) of the Bill.

To enhance safety and ease of mobility for persons with disabilities, the bill has mandated national and county governments to equip pedestrian crossings with traffic control signs controlled by a pedestrian push button system.

Similarly, authorities in the transport sector should provide persons with disabilities with clearly audible signs. Operators of Public Service Vehicles should also ensure their vehicles adhere to both safety and mobility standards that are in compliant to the needs of people with disabilities and as specified by the National Council for Persons with Disabilities.

"A registered owner of a public transport vehicle shall adjust the vehicle to suit persons with disabilities in such a manner as maybe specified the Council in consultation with the relevant government agencies. A registered owner of public transport vehicle who improves or modifies it to make it accessible for persons with disabilities shall be entitled to apply to the Cabinet Secretary responsible for fiancé for twenty-five per cent of the direct cost of the improvements and modifications," reads Article 73. (1), (2) of the Bill.

Honourable Lucy Wanyitu who is the Chair on Delegated Legislation at the County Assembly of Nyeri has welcomed the proposed regulation which she says will help curb discrimination against persons living with disabilities.

The lawmaker says the Bill will also put an end to unscrupulous individuals who have been using persons with disabilities as conduits for quick financial gains instead of assisting them to come up with some form of income generating opportunities.

She says she is still going through the Bill and will present her recommendations before the Bill is presented to President Dr William Ruto for signing into law.

Youth, Women, PWDs secure Sh4.15b in tenders from KPLC

Businesses owned by youth, women, and persons with disabilities (PWDs) secured tenders worth Sh4.15 billion from Kenya Power and Lighting Company during the last financial year.

Kenya Power's General Manager for Supply Chain and Logistics, Dr. John Ngeno, attributed the impressive uptake of Access to Government Procurement Opportunities (AGPO) tenders to the company's deliberate efforts to sensitize target groups about procurement opportunities.

"During the last financial year, we continued educational forums for special interest groups on how to participate in our procurement process," said Ngeno.

In a press statement, Ngeno mentioned that the uptake surpassed the Sh1.2 billion target set for the year under the Access to Government Procurement Opportunities program.

"In the previous financial year which ended June 30, 2023, the Company

awarded Sh472 million worth of tenders to these special interest groups," he said.

He said that the uptake has been steady over the years owing to these engagements and they hoped to sustain 100 percent absorption of their annual AGPO budget as more Kenyans become aware of these opportunities.

He divulged that under the AGPO category, the Company awards tenders that are not highly technical.

"Such tenders include the supply of locally available materials and common user items, works and services, and the provision of cleaning services, among others," he added.

The General Manager observed that youth-owned businesses took up the biggest chunk of the total value of AGPO tenders accounting for Sh3.8 billion followed by those owned by women and PWDs at Sh324 million and Sh1.3 million respectively.

"Through AGPO, we aim to foster inclusivity

in our procurement processes. Going forward, our focus will be more on persons with disabilities and women. Through tailored engagements, we want to ensure that they participate actively in our procurement as is the case with the youth," said Ngeno.

Ngeno said that the Company would continue to work collaboratively with financial institutions to provide linkages for financial support to the interest groups to facilitate their participation in the procurement processes.

"This is in addition to sensitization workshops and conferences targeting these groups, pre-bid conferences during the tendering period to enhance knowledge, increased publicity of the available AGPO opportunities as well as prompt payment for suppliers to strengthen their cash flow" he said.

He further said that during the current financial year, the Company is targeting to award Sh11.6 billion worth of AGPO tenders to the three special interest groups.

Kones pointed out that the successful implementation of the County Licensing (Uniform Procedures) Act, 2024, will be a crucial step towards creating a more business-friendly environment in all the Counties and unlocking the country's economic potential.

Official calls for action as femicide claims 21 lives in three weeks

The National Gender and Equality Commission (NGEC) will continue to partner with counties, the national government, Parliament, and the community to address the rising cases of Gender-Based Violence (GBV) in the country.

The Commission's Vice Chairperson, Thomas Koyier, speaking at ICT Hall in Migori town during a discussion with various groups, including women, youth, gender professionals, and men, highlighted that they will continue to fulfill their role as communicators of awareness messages against GBV.

NGEC was established by the National Gender and Equality Commission Act of 2011 to focus on special interest groups, including women, youth, persons with disabilities,

children, older members of society, minorities, and marginalized groups. It is also tasked with promoting gender equality and freedom from all forms of discrimination through compliance with established policies, laws, and practices to create a society free from gender inequality and all forms of discrimination.

Koyier noted that in the last three weeks, the country has lost 21 women to femicide, a

worrying trend that, if unchecked, could lead to further harm and loss of life. Migori County has also seen a surge of GBV that currently stands at 51 percent, making the county among the top five counties in the country that continue to report cases of GBV.

Koyier said that the economic loss associated with femicide is unimaginable to the family and the country urging the community to address the negative vice.

Tourism stakeholders to safeguard Kwale’s award winning beaches

Tourism stakeholders are stepping up efforts to formulate a bill aimed at facilitating the sustainable, effective, and inclusive management of beaches in Kwale. A study on the socio-economic impact of sand harvesting at Diani Beach and the dumping of dredged port materials at Shelly Beach has informed the bill’s development.

The bill seeks to adopt policy and legislative measures to minimize the negative impact of sand harvesting while enhancing the value of the pristine beaches. Last year, the World Travel Awards voted Diani Beach the leading beach destination in Africa for the eighth time.

If passed by the Kwale County Assembly, the bill will promote the conservation of the beach ecosystem, improve the aesthetic value of the beaches, and facilitate a coordinated, integrated approach to managing operations and activities at the beaches.

The bill will also assign various duties to all stakeholders involved. Additionally, a law gov-

erning beach infrastructure will be implemented, and beach trade will be investigated.

The bill designates an area to serve as a public beach for the residents of Kwale County. The enactment of the bill is expected to have a significant positive impact on the coastal environment.

The bill will curb sand harvesting, helping to reduce the degradation of the endangered marine ecosystem and enhance tourism.

Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers and Caterers Executive Officer Sam Ikwaye said no coastal county has passed legislation for the management of beaches since the advent of devolution.

“It is imperative as stakeholders we come together and discuss how we can protect these resources,” stated Dr Ikwaye during a consultative meeting with

tourism stakeholders in Diani.

He noted that over the years, agencies undertaking development in the region have made Diani their cheapest source of sand for development.

“We are objecting to this and that is why we are urging our County Government of Kwale to fast-track the enactment of this bill to have a mechanism in place that we can use to safeguard beach resources,” expounded Dr. Ikwaye.

He further explained that the Dongo Kundu bypass and the expansion of Diani Airport would lead to exponential growth in the tourism town.

“If we don’t work together as industry stakeholders, particularly those depending on tourism, given that it is the mainstay in this region, we are going to have investments catching up with conservation and we are going to lose our resources,” Dr. Ikwaye cautioned.

He revealed that Kwale County Governor Fatuma Achari has assured the stakeholders of her unwavering support for ensuring the bill passes in the Assembly.

Yala Swamp artisans call on state to secure global market for products

For many years, swampy areas in Busia and Siaya counties were viewed as a threat to human settlement and considered uneconomical, leading to most of them being left as habitats for crocodiles and hippopotamuses. However, Yala Swamp is proving to be vital in the economic revitalization of households in Budalang’i, where locals are now turning reeds from the swamp into beautifully woven baskets that are worthy of the international market.

For instance, handwoven baskets (Esimwero) are exactly what their name implies—baskets made by hand, with skilled artisans weaving materials together. These baskets have boosted NEEMA’s efforts in the fight against plastic bags.

Buungu village in Bunyala subcounty is ushering in a new era of African handwoven baskets, a fascinating aspect of African culture and craftsmanship. These baskets are not only practical items for storage and transport, but they also carry significant cultural and symbolic meanings.

Isaac Kayamba, the master behind the art and a resident of Busia has been the trainer and supplier of unique baskets which has continued to give Buungu village identity and uniqueness on market industry.

From baskets, tra-



ditional Matts and chicken cages Kayamba seems to have conquered the hearts of many from his artisan work.

“I acquired these skills from my fathers, and for many years I have empowered myself and family through these artisan works,” said Kayamba.

For decades now, Kayamba and his peers have carried on the craft passed down from their ancestors, transforming palm tree leaves into beautiful baskets and other items which provide employment opportunities for many in their community.

He has highlighted the economic potential of traditional crafts as a reliable source of income for artisans from the Yala Swamp.

“Our craftsmanship has great potential, but without international market access,

its value remains limited. We urge the government to support us in reaching global markets so we can unlock the full economic benefits of our work and uplift our livelihoods,” he said.

Just like Isaac, Edwin Onyango also

believed that some cultural activities, if well molded and with the right market established could employ many in rural setup.

Despitefully, this Busia basket artisans face a myriad of challenges such as the interference of brokers in the market chain and perennial problem of floods which hindered them from exploring their artwork to the full potential.

Onyango narrates how these middlemen often purchase products at significantly lower prices, leaving the artisans with minimal profits despite their hard work.

“Brokers take advantage of us. They buy at throwaway prices and sell for huge profits. We end up incurring losses instead of enjoying the fruits of our labor,” he lamented.

“We are urging both the county and national government to find an international market for our products. We are now producing bamboo chairs which are being imported from China and other parties of the country,” Onyango added.

Speaking in Molo, the area Social Services boss, Gypson Kangogo, stated that those who fail to migrate will not be able to access their cash.

He added that the department has intensified mobilization efforts through the chiefs, community, and religious leaders to ensure that information reaches everyone before the February 15th, 2025 migration deadline. “We are working with local administrators and other leaders to ensure that all beneficiaries comply with this new directive,” said Kangogo.

“This is a very crucial exercise, and anyone who has this information

should kindly share it with any beneficiary out there,” he added.

He further clarified that the exercise was not meant to recruit new beneficiaries to the programme, but to assist the existing beneficiaries through the E-Citizen platform, which is expected to streamline the service. Primary beneficiaries of the Inua Jamii programme are elderly people aged 70 and above, persons with severe disabilities, and households facing extreme poverty.

To register, eligible individuals must provide

national identification details and, in some cases, additional documentation such as medical certificates for those with disabilities. The exercise is taking place at designated government offices and selected centers

across the sub-county.

“Those incapacitated should not shy away since the process has been designed to be as accessible as possible, and teams have been stationed in various locations to assist applicants who may need help navigating the system,” noted Kangogo.

In an effort to make the payment process more efficient, the government has partnered with Safaricom and moving forward, beneficiaries of the programme would be receiving stipend through their registered Safaricom line.

County, REREC partner for 24-hour economy electrification project

The initiative aims to create a conducive environment for a 24-hour economy by providing businesses with electricity to operate around the clock.

Speaking during the launch at the county headquarters in Eldoret, Uasin Gishu County Governor Dr. Jonathan Bii lauded the initiative, describing it as a transformative project aimed at improving electricity access across rural villages in the county.

He emphasized that electricity provision is a key pillar of his Nguzo Kumi development blue-

print, which prioritizes socio-economic empowerment for residents.

“This initiative will drive economic growth in rural areas by promoting entrepreneurship, enabling access to digital jobs, and enhancing product development,” noted the Governor.

The Stima Mashinani initiative is integrated with the Angaza Mashinani program, which focuses on lighting rural and urban centers to enhance security and promote a 24-hour economy.

“In line with this vision, my administration partnered with the Rural Electrification and Renewable Energy Corporation (REREC) through the Matching Fund Programme to connect underserved areas to electricity,” alluded Dr. Bii.

The first phase of the Stima Mashinani project will see more than 600 households connected to electricity across the county.

Nairobi to host conference on agrifood systems sustainability

Nairobi is set to host the second Financing Agrifood Systems Sustainability (FINAS) 2025 Dialogue Conference from May 20th to 22nd at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC). On Tuesday, stakeholders in the agri-food systems sector convened for

an insightful pre-conference dialogue, building up to the FINAS 2025 Conference in Nairobi.

The workshop on loan classification taxonomy focused on the vital role of the agricultural loan classification system in accelerating financing for the food and agriculture sector.

The workshop was convened by GIZ Kenya, the

FINAS 2025 Conference Secretariat, and AgriFinancing, with input from agricultural lending institutions, regulators, AGRA, FSD-K, and others.

Speaking during the pre-conference dialogue in Nairobi, Dr. Charity Mutege, Technical Advisory Manager at Rootooba Limited, said that a structured framework for categoriz-

ing loan data can provide deeper insights into sectoral and value chain exposures as well as borrower profiles.

"A uniform system (taxonomy) will improve reporting accuracy, highlight funding gaps, support informed decision-making, and strengthen risk management," said Mutege.

She also noted that one

of the issues addressed in last year's FINAS dialogue was the urgent need for improved data to support decision-making around agricultural financing in agri-food systems.

"Our vision as stakeholders is to create better data on credit exposure across value chains and actors in agriculture to improve agricultural lending

and financing in the Agri-food systems," she said.

Mutege said that stakeholders are relooking and repurposing financing based on pressing needs within the Agri food system. This could be as a result of shocks like pandemic or the fact "we have been financing the agricultural sector in a way that needs rethinking."

Businesses in Kenol set for growth with new Sh1.3b sewer infrastructure

Businesses and investments in Kenol town, located in the southern part of Murang'a County, are expected to intensify with the completion of a Sh1.3 billion sewer system.

The construction of the system, which commenced in 2021, was completed last month, providing locals—especially the business community and investors—with a hygienic environment to operate in.

Kenol town, located along the Nairobi-Marua highway, has been ranked among the fastest-growing towns in the country due to its proximity to Thika and Nairobi.

The town, which began developing in the early 1990s, had property owners relying on septic tanks for waste disposal. Some unscrupulous residential property owners opted to empty raw sewage into rivers and abandoned quarries, putting residents at risk of contracting diseases.

The waste disposal system was also costly, as it required regular emptying of the septic tanks using hired vacuum trucks.

One resident, Lucy Wangari, noted that due to the lack of a sewer line, residents had to take precautions for fear of waterborne diseases.

"We are used to treating our water before using it because most of the water we access here comes from boreholes. We fear it's contaminated due to improper disposal of raw sewage, which could cause diseases," said Wangari.

She added that the new sewer project would protect residents from the risk of waterborne diseases and mentioned that rental property owners have already started connecting their waste disposal pipes to the sewer line.

Golden Palm Hotel owner

Eng. Njau Njoka stated that exhaust operators had been exploiting property owners by charging exorbitant fees for their services.

"The operators charged Sh12,000 per truck, and Golden Palm Hotel has four septic tanks. However, with the completion of the sewer system, the hotel was among the first premises to be connected to the sewer line, which is definitely a more convenient and safe waste disposal system," said Njoka.

Community leader Beth Githaiga noted that the project would greatly benefit businesses in Kenol and should be extended to nearby towns in Kagundini ward, including the Kabati market.

"Muswasco should consider extending the service to the markets in Kagundini that can be connected to the sewerage system," said Githaiga.

The project has increased the value of the property at Kenol market

Joseph Manyeki, who chairs the Kenol Traders Association, says the sewerage project will fast-track the growth of the town through improved sanitation.

Manyeki, of Seaton agencies' properties, said the sewerage system has created employment opportunities for the plumbers as their services will be required within the municipality to connect buildings with the sewer line.

"The project has increased the value of the property at Kenol market due to reduced costs of using the exhaust system," said Manyeki.

An exhaust dealer, Chege Mbatia, said the sewerage project will affect their businesses negatively as they concentrated within the Kenol market, which had more residential buildings operating septic tanks.

Clement Kamau, a member of the Kenol Municipality Board, said the sewerage project will reduce the cost of putting up and draining their sewers through the exhausters.

Public Health Director Muthui Gitonga gave the project a clean bill as he called on the locals to con-

nect with the sewer line.

"This is a milestone to ensure the sanitation of the town is improved as we urge more investors to consider putting up businesses in the town," said Muthui.

Muswasco Managing Director John Macharia said since completion of the project last month, many premises have been connected with the sewer line.

Macharia explained that the project is a significant change in the upgrading plan of the Kenol Municipality through improved sanitation, with the sewer treatment plant located 10 km away.

"Muswasco is working with the locals and business community to ensure all buildings are connected with the sewer line. The company has also put in place measures to supply 7,500 cubic metres of water per day which is crucial for a disposal mechanism," said the Director.

Macharia further stated that a sewer system has been a necessity following the growth of the town, even as laying of a pipeline supplying more water from Mareira in Kigumo to Kenol was completed last year.



University students develop cybersecurity App to combat rising cybercrime cases

Three university students have created a cybersecurity program aimed at combating attacks that have sharply increased due to the rise in online transactions and activities.

The application is designed to offer real-time monitoring and analysis to detect, prevent, and address security threats against local Kenyan businesses and individuals.

The app targets common cybercrimes in the country, including phishing attacks, malware, false publications, money transfer fraud, credit card fraud, and cyberterrorism.

The program developers, including 20-year-old Vincent Karanja, 21-year-old Ian Keiza, and 20-year-old Norah Chesit, said they came up with the innovation after realizing that cybercrimes were becoming a growing menace for government agencies, non-governmental organizations, corporations, Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), e-commerce platforms, and financial institutions such as banks and Savings and Credit Cooperative Organizations (SACCOs).

The trio, all experts in the Internet of Things (IoT) and Robotics, are beneficiaries of the Shs 6.5 billion (USD 50 million) World Bank-funded Strengthening Kenya's Innovation Ecosystem (SKIES) scholarship program and were showcasing their innovation during the graduation of 97 apprentices at the Rift

Valley Institute of Business Studies (RVIBS) in Nakuru. The Institute was awarded Sh 10 million and raised a further Sh 4 million towards co-funding the implementation of the SKIES scholarship program.

SKIES, which is being implemented by the Ministry of Investments, Trade and Industry through the State Department for Industry, aims at enhancing innovation ecosystem infrastructure by building the capacity of 13 Kenyan intermediaries such as incubators, accelerators, and technology boot camp providers.

Through the Kenya Industrial and Entrepreneurship Project (KIEP), the government is supporting the intermediaries who also include 8 universities and 500 individuals in startups in developing and deepening their operational strengths and individual business models, ensuring operational sustainability, expansion and improved quality of services provided.

According to KIEP Project Coordinator at the State Department for Industry Phillip Maita, SKIES was providing performance-based grants to intermediaries and innovation hubs and were working with

Technical Vocational Education Training Institutes and universities to provide skills on innovation.

The coordinator further said that the project's agenda was strategically aligned with national development goals such as Kenya Vision 2030 as well as the global Sustainable Development Goals and Africa Agenda 2063.

KIEP Project Manager Mr John Muinami advised Universities, Technical Vocational Education Training Institutes (TVETs) and polytechnics to set up innovation and incubation centers to attract investors, venture capitalists and corporate partners who are keen to move innovative ideas to the next level.

He said governments in the continent were increasingly facing challenges in creating jobs with reality being that there were more training opportunities than there are job openings, a situation he said was creating a large population of young people in Africa with skills and knowledge but no jobs.

"We have to produce graduates who become employers. More importantly we should produce graduates who are able to walk confidently into a number of careers and opportunities," stated the manager.

Innovation Ecosystem Manager at KIEP Ms Cecilia Mwangi urged students and instructors at TVETs to forge powerful collaborations with the business sector to translate

research findings into industrial resources to create wealth and jobs.

To achieve this, she said TVETs should deliberately march towards becoming the springboards of economic development in the country by playing a more proactive role in supporting an innovation ecosystem, especially through recognition of innovation that could be patented.

Ms Mwangi observed that commercialization of research was becoming a common practice in most parts of the world where the private sector partners with universities and technical training institutes to develop innovations in sectors such as telecommunications, medicine and engineering, resulting to the technical training institutes and universities earning extra revenue.

She urged Technical and Vocational Education

and Training (TVET) institutes to commercialize innovations invented by their students and tutors to enable them tap their full potential in generating revenue.

Rift Valley Institute of Business Director Mr Kimemia Gitau said although 2,200 youth applied for the SKIES scholarship, the institute was only granted 97 slots where the beneficiaries were university graduates and Diploma holders who were equipped with skills to be job creators and not employment seekers.

While observing that the SKIES scholarship venture was a positive step is bridging the skills gap in the Kenyan job market, Mr Gitau called for public-private partnerships to sponsor the growing number of innovative youth who are seeking to realize their dreams.

He affirmed that Sci-

ence, Technology and Innovation were increasingly important to our personal life and were also fundamental to the economic development of any given country.

The increased cyber-security threats are attributed to the global increase in malware and high level of unemployment of tech savvy youth with many Kenyan businesses said to be losing billions of shillings and troves of sensitive information to hackers every year according to experts.

A new report by the Communications Authority of Kenya (CA) shows that cyber threats detected by the Kenya Computer Incident Response Team Coordination Centre (Ke-CIRT/CC) increased by 943 per cent and attributed this to limited investments in cybersecurity and outdated security systems.

How untrained mediators keep peace in villages and informal settlements

Deep within the heart of Kenya's vibrant informal settlements and serene villages, a unique form of justice quietly unfolds. Long before the modern court system, communities relied on the wisdom of elders, respected figures, and even ordinary citizens to resolve conflicts peacefully. These untrained mediators, armed with nothing more

than their understanding of local customs, social norms, and human nature, have played a crucial role in maintaining harmony within their communities.

While formal mediation processes have gained prominence in recent years, the role of these informal mediators remains indispensable. They are the first line of defense against escalating disputes, often preventing them from reaching a boiling point that could disrupt the

fragile social fabric of these communities.

A renowned mediator, Charles Torori, has gained a great deal of respect in the informal settlement and within his SDA church, where he serves as an elder. In an interview with KNA at his home in Kaptembwo Estate, he noted that untrained mediators possess a deep understanding of the intricate social dynamics within their communities. They know the history of the

families involved, the nuances of local customs, and the sensitivities that must be carefully navigated. This intimate knowledge allows them to tailor their approach to each specific situation, ensuring that the resolution not only addresses the immediate conflict but also preserves the long-term harmony of the community.

He observed that without the quiet peacemakers in the informal estates, the chaos would be much more

than what is witnessed daily. "In these areas all sorts of people become neighbors and since they come from various communities, it takes time for them to appreciate each other. And, some are not only drunkards but delinquents who have run away from where they are known to seek hideouts in the informal settlements—naturally they fuel more chaos, which require immediate solutions," he stressed. Torori said un-

like formal legal proceedings, which often focus on apportioning blame and punishment, these informal mediations prioritize restorative justice. The emphasis is on repairing the harm caused by the conflict, restoring relationships, and ensuring that the community remains whole. This approach, he explained fosters a sense of shared responsibility and encourages dialogue and understanding between the parties involved.

DFS trains youth on film skills to empower them in movie making

The Principal Secretary for Youth Affairs and Creative Economy Ismail Maalim Madey has launched a nationwide initiative to train young Kenyans on essential film skills aimed at addressing shortage of skilled professionals.

Partnering with the Department of Film Services and the Kenya Film School, the State Department has concluded intensive film workshops across

key regions, reaching over 200 aspiring filmmakers in Mombasa, Nairobi, Kisumu, Eldoret, Kisii, Nakuru, Embu, and Garissa.

Among the areas covered in the nationwide training include camera to screen, cinematography, sound and lighting, screenwriting, post production, and costume designs.

PS Madey emphasized the importance of these skills in the digital age, where platforms like YouTube and streaming ser-

vices offer opportunities to monetize creative content noting that these skills, combined with talent, will enable young Kenyans to turn their filmmaking passion into rewarding careers.

“Everyone has a specific God-given talent. Talent is money and if you don’t make an effort to convert the talent into business, then the talent is with you for nothing because it’s not bringing out value,” Madey said.

“The biggest challenge we have is the mindset. The talent and the brain that has formed Hollywood in the US is not different from the brains of our youth. If you go out of your way and think big, get out of your comfort zone and come up with a very good movie, how many people would you have employed?” he posed.

The PS also announced that the government is going to come up with a creative economy week where




youths will be called to showcase their creativity and network with notable figures in the industry.

Acting Director for Film Services, Regis Ondieki, highlighted that these programs aim to elevate Film Standards, encourage the creation of high-quality, competitive Kenyan films and create employment by building a pipeline of skilled professionals, including cinematographers, editors, and actors.

This initiative is a signifi-

cant step in nurturing a new generation of Kenyan filmmakers because by investing in young people’s skills and development, the government is laying the foundation for a thriving and globally recognized Kenyan film industry.

“Film is there to tell a story and at the same time, behind the scenes we have the creative personnel that build up and create the stories and transform the written words into visuals and sound,” Ondieki said.

Kenya advances toward global engineering recognition

Kenya is making significant strides toward achieving provisional signatory status under the prestigious Washington Accord, a move that will elevate the global standing of Kenyan engineering graduates and facilitate their practice across member countries. According to Eng. Margaret Ogai, Registrar and the CEO of the Engineers Board of Kenya (EBK), the Washington Accord is an international agreement that acknowledges the substantial equivalence of engineering education accreditation systems world-wide. “Kenya’s progression toward this recognition underscores the nation’s commitment to aligning its engineering education with global standards. The Engineers Board of Kenya (EBK), established under


Section 3(1) of the Engineers Act 2011, is at the forefront of this initiative,” said Eng Ogai. The CEO disclosed that the Act mandates the Board to regulate the engineering profession through the registration of engineers, setting of standards, and development of the profession. “The Act empowers EBK to collaborate with engineering training institutions, professional associations, engineering organizations, and other relevant bodies on matters related to training and professional development,” she said. Eng Ogai observed that a pivotal component in this journey is the Engineering Accreditation Committee (EAC), a semi-autonomous arm of EBK. “The EAC is responsible for overseeing and conducting the recognition and accreditation of engineering programs in Kenya, ensuring they meet the rigorous standards required for international recognition,” noted the CEO. She pointed out in October 2022, EBK joined the World Federation of Engineering Organizations, enabling Kenya to garner support from member states. Commenting on capacity building for accreditation, the CEO noted that EBK has conducted extensive workshops and training sessions for universities and assessors, promoting Outcome-Based Education (OBE) as a framework for accreditation. Eng Ogai said that EBK has formed the Engineering Accreditation Committee, a body that will spearhead accreditation activities and strengthen institutional partnerships

The CEO noted that their evaluation will determine Kenya’s readiness for provisional signatory status, with the final decision anticipated at the International Engineering Alliance Meeting later this year. “Achieving recognition under the Washington Accord will elevate Kenya’s engineering education system and bolster the global mobility of our engineers,” the CEO stated. “This milestone is a testament to our dedication to fostering excellence and professionalism in engineering,” noted Eng. Ogai

Sugar industry reforms sweeten deal for farmers after years of suffering

An increase in cane price, introduction of bonus payment, provision of subsidised fertiliser and new regulations are helping to revive the once-struggling industry

The Government's move to introduce bonus payment for farmers in the sugar sector sweetens the ongoing reforms aimed at reviving the industry, which had collapsed forcing the country to rely on imports.

The bonus, announced by President William Ruto last week, puts more money in farmers' pockets, motivating the producers who have suffered for years.

Farmers in Kakamega County who supply their cane to Mumias Sugar Factory are the first to receive the bonus payment, with President Ruto handing them Sh150 million.

"This historic bonus payment to farmers not only validates the success of the reforms introduced in the sugar sector, but is also evidence of the potential to uplift farmers and support tens of thousands of livelihoods," President Ruto said.

He observed that the bonus payment is part of the continued reforms the Government is carrying out in the sugar industry.

To thousands of small-scale cane farmers, the bonus payment marks a significant shift in their social-economic status as they can use the money to access better healthcare, buy food for their children, pay school fees or expand their farms.

"This is a turning point to sugarcane farmers



across the country. We are encouraged and feel honoured by the Government," Mathew Sisia, a farmer said.

Other reforms initiated by the Government include raising the price of cane per tonne from Sh4,950 to Sh5,000, provision of subsidised fertilisers, expansion of production by 500 acres, operationalisation of 17 sugar factories and the construction of four more and formulation of a new sugar law.

The Sugar Bill, 2022, which was signed into law in November last year, seeks to revitalise

the industry by enhancing growth, regulation, and support for cane farmers across the country.

The law re-established the Kenya Sugar Board, handing back to it roles that had been transferred to the Sugar Directorate of the Agriculture and Food Authority.

The law also introduced a Sugar Development Levy capped at 4 per cent of both the value of domestic sugar and the Cost Insurance Freight value of imports.

Sugarcane farmers, thanks to the law, also

benefit from 40 per cent of the funds that go to cane development and 15 per cent to factory rehabilitation.

These reforms are paying off with deliveries to factories by farmers in the months to July 2024 hitting 5.5 million metric tonnes (MT), the highest level in over 10 years, according to the Agriculture and Food Authority.

Domestic sugar output has also risen significantly, standing at an average of 84,000 MT monthly, more than double the national monthly demand of 40,000 MT.

In 2024, a record 832,000 tonnes of sugar were produced, putting Kenya on course to attaining surplus production.

"By 2026, Kenya should be a surplus producer of sugar and begin exporting to the regional market," President Ruto said.

The bonus payment, according to him, would have a substantial impact on the growth of the sugar sector as Kenya eyes exports.

"The bonus will be distributed to farmers on a pro-rata basis, depending on the quantity of sugarcane each farmer supplies to the miller," he said, adding that this will enhance transparency and that it will be adjusted appropriately based on the company's performance.

Mumias Sugar Company is the first to implement the bonus model, which will be replicated in other publicly owned sugar companies once they are leased, the President said.

"Additionally, Cane Testing Units will be utilised to ensure farmers receive additional payments based on the quality of their cane along with the payments based on weight," the President said.

Kenya has 16 sugar factories, out of which the Government owns six - Mumias, Miwani, Chemilil, Muhoroni, Nzoia and Sony.

Cane farming, which supports millions of farmers, is grown in Nyando zone (Chemilil, Kibos, Muhoroni and Soin), South Nyanza zone (Sony Sugar, Sukari and Transmara), Western region (Mumias, Nzoia, West Kenya and Butali) and Kwale at the Coast, where there is Kwale International Sugar Company factory.

The Government in 2024 wrote off Sh117 billion in debts sugar firms owned it, paid Sh1.7 billion in farmers' arrears and Sh650 million owed to employees, other actions that have helped revive the sector.

Provision of subsidised fertiliser has equally motivated sugarcane farmers, with the Government in 2024 supplying 700,000 bags. President Ruto ordered this be increased to a million in 2025.

"I have also asked the new Cabinet Secretary for Agriculture Mutahi Kagwe to finalise regulations to operationalise the Sugar Act to provide clarity and get rid of cartels in the sector," he said.

A number of sugar factories are also back to profitability, with South Nyanza Sugar Company (Sony) making a pre-tax profit of Sh113 million in the first quarter of the financial year 2024/2025, after a decade of struggling with losses. Managing Director Martine Dima notes that the company is on the right trajectory, following the positive pre-tax profit since 2010. ■

SHA registration gains momentum as millions enrol

At least 18.2m people register under the Social Health Authority boosting efforts to provide quality healthcare to all citizens

The Government is making significant progress in its quest to register all Kenyans under the Social Health Insurance Fund (NHIF), noting that more people who were not covered initially have now enrolled to benefit from the new scheme.

"Since October 2024, 907,853 people have utilised primary healthcare among SHA members and claims valued at Sh14.6 billion have been approved," Public Health and Professional Standards PS Mary Muriuki said.

Muriuki said the Government is committed to fully rolling out the new health scheme, making access and delivery of health care easier.

The Government launched SHIF in October 2024 to expand access to quality healthcare.

SHIF provides health insurance to every citizen, including those in the informal sector and vulnerable groups who had been historically neglected.

Every Kenyan, and any person who is not a Kenyan, but ordinarily resides in Kenya for more than year, or any child born after the commencement of the Social Health Insurance Act, No. 16 of 2023, are by law required to

The Government revamped Linda Mama programme under SHA, offering expectant mothers a comprehensive package that includes free antenatal check-ups, free delivery services, immunisations for newborns and coverage for delivery complications.

For normal delivery, SHA pays a fee of Sh10,000, an increase from Sh5,000 under the old programme. On the other hand, SHA pays Sh34,200, which includes a hospital stay of three days, for those mothers who have delivered through caesarian section. This is an increase from Sh17,500.

And regardless of whether a mother delivers in public or a private hospital, SHA will pay a standard cost of Sh10,000 for normal deliveries and Sh30,000 for higher-tier facilities, enhancing universal health access.

The programme ensures that all women access maternal health services unhindered, therefore, promoting safer deliveries in hospitals and discouraging those who may want to visit traditional midwives due to financial challenges. ■

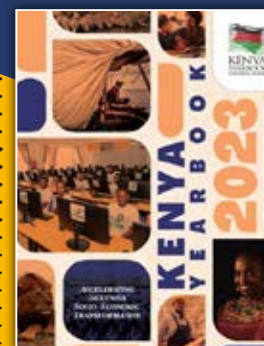

KNBS, CBK launch innovative inflation report to enhance economic planning

In a significant milestone for Kenya's economic planning, the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) and the Central Bank of Kenya (CBK) have officially launched the country's first comprehensive Core and Non-Core Inflation Report.

The launch follows months of collaboration between the two institutions, culminating in a technical workshop held in Naivasha in June 2024.

The new measures, which provide deeper insights into price dynamics, are set to transform how inflation is analyzed and addressed.

Speaking during the launch, Principal Secretary (PS) for Economic Planning, James Muhati, said the report marked a significant milestone in the government's ongoing efforts to provide greater transparency, deeper insights, and more effective responses to inflationary trends that affect the country's major businesses and households.

He added that the report was a key milestone in the government's journey to improving the quality of its data. "When we talk about data quality, we mean the factors that must be met regarding the data we provide," stressed the PS, adding

ing that the data must be available, timely, and verifiable, among other factors.

Muhati disclosed that the report was a joint effort between the KNBS and CBK, developed in line with international best practices.

According to the PS, the collaboration is a testament to the government's commitment to sound, reliable data and provides a solid foundation for informed policy and effective decision-making.

"Inflation is a multifaceted phenomenon faced by numerous factors. Traditionally, a single inflation measure has served as

a general gauge for price changes and this approach can secure critical details," he explained.

Also speaking at the event, KNBS Director General (DG) Dr. MacDonald Obudho described the initiative as a step towards providing more precise and actionable data for economic policy formulation.

He underscored that core inflation, derived from the national Consumer Price Index (CPI), excluded volatile items such as food and fuel to offer a more stable measure of underlying inflation.

According to Dr. Obudho,

the data would enable policymakers to focus on long-term trends rather than short-term fluctuations caused by weather patterns or global shocks, such as the Russia-Ukraine conflict or rising fuel prices.

"The CBK will now have readily available core inflation data, which eliminates the need for additional calculations and ensures faster decision-making," stated the DG.

In his remarks, CBK Governor Dr. Kamau Thugge emphasized the importance of the new measures in achieving macroeconomic stability.

Government distributes fertilizer in West Pokot

Residents of West Pokot County have expressed immense joy following the national government's early distribution of fertilizers for use during the long rains season.

The much-awaited fertilizer delivery, typically distributed during planting time, has been warmly welcomed by farmers who are hopeful for a better harvest.

According to the National Cereals and Produce Board (NCPB) Communications Officer, Titus Mayo, the fertilizers supplied are sufficient for the farmers.

"The early delivery is a major boost for farmers in this region. The fertilizers will be available until the end of the long rains. We are confident that farmers will achieve better yields this year," said Mayo.

He explained that the government would also distribute top-dressing fertilizers to provide continued support throughout the growing season.

Mayo further reassured farmers that they would receive their allocations without fear of shortages, provided they were properly registered.

"There is no need for concern. As long as farmers are registered, they will receive their fertilizers on time," he added. While farmers welcomed the early delivery, some expressed concerns based on past experiences.

"We hope this fertilizer is better than last year's because last year's fertilizer had a mixture of sand and stones, which affected our crops. We hope this one will be of good quality and help our plants grow well," they said.

They said the timely delivery of the fertilizers has brought relief to many farmers, allowing them to prepare their land and ensure their crops have the necessary nutrients to thrive during the crucial planting season.

"This is a welcome move and it gives us enough time to apply fertilizers and prepare our land without the usual rush," said the farmers.

They however appealed to the National Cereals and Produce Board (NCPB) to establish additional distribution centers at the local level.

New Moi University Council appointed

The government, through the Ministry of Education, has inaugurated the new Moi University Council and tasked the team with saving the institution from collapse.

Education Cabinet Secretary Julius Ogamba stated that the government has taken a deliberate step to restore order and ensure the normal functioning of the university, which has lost its standing as a key institution of higher learning. This decline has been caused by governance issues, leading the university into a state of despondency.

The new council will be chaired by Noah Midamba. The four new members of the council are Ronald Wasike, Mercy Nyambura Kanyara, Edward Sambili, and Ann Waceke Makori.

Through a Gazette Notice dated January 17, 2025, Ogamba revoked the appointments of Dr. Humphrey Njuguna and those who had been serving as council members, including Prof. Sarah Samiji Momanyi, Christopher Khaemba, Eusila Ngenyi, and Susan Amlango Aletia.

Speaking during the inauguration, CS Ogamba cautioned the new council that steering the institution to its desired glory would not be a bed of roses.

He thanked the outgoing council for the contribution it made to the university and said that going forward, the government would keenly oversee management at the public universities and would no longer tolerate laxity in the running of the institutions.

The CS said the government was determined to make painful decisions that would help spur development of the universities.

He said the university councils must help maintain quality education and also respond to changing job markets and the global economy.

Ogamba called on the universities to reform their curricula to suit other demands and changes globally.

Wajir, Authority launch water trucking initiative to mitigate impact of drought

Wajir County Government, in collaboration with the National Drought Management Authority (NDMA), has launched a water trucking initiative aimed at alleviating the impact of the ongoing drought across all sub-counties in Wajir.

Speaking in Sukeyla, Wajir South Sub-County, NDMA Chief Executive Officer Haret Aden stated that the agency has initiated early mitigation plans following the below-average October to December rainfall last year and the previous rain season.

Aden, who was accompanied by Wajir South Member of Parliament Mohamed Adow and County Director of Water Mohamed Farah, revealed that 132 centres and 117 learning

institutions in the county currently required water trucking interventions. "To address the current situation, we have started early planning. Yesterday, we had a meeting with the

county leadership and non-state actors operating in the county to map out interventions and identify hot-spots," said Aden. According to the latest NDMA January report, Wajir is among the counties hardest hit by drought, with the majority of its population relying on open water sources that have now dried up. Aden further noted that NDMA is also extending support to other drought-affected counties, such as Marsabit.

"We will continue working closely with the leadership and the affected counties to ensure drought does not escalate into a crisis," Aden reiterated.
