## Gov't warns private hospitals sabotaging Taifa Care program

Outgoing Health Principal Secretary Harry Kimtai accused some private hospitals of engaging in a manipulative scheme, deliberately denying outpatient services to pressure the government to pay off outstanding medical claims owed to them under the defunct NHIF

Private hospitals that decline to offer outpatient services under the Taifa Care program risk having their operating licenses revoked.

Outgoing Health Principal Secretary Harry Kimtai said the government will not hesitate to take stern action against such facilities, accusing them of jeopardizing the lives

of Kenyans and sabotaging the national medical scheme.

Speaking in Embu Town during the handover of new digitization devices for the Taifa Care health program, Kimtai accused some private hospitals of deliberately denying outpatient services to pressure the government into settling outstanding medical claims owed to them un-

He emphasized that the government will not be coerced into meeting these

## State recruits 40,000 for Nairobi Rivers clean-up

Over 40,000 youths from Nairobi will be recruited for the Nairobi Rivers Regeneration Project.

The project aims to enhance the city's profile to attract more investors and improve its economic output.

The youths will play a crucial role in accelerating the implementation of key initiatives under the Climate WorX program, funded by the national government. Their tasks will include cleaning the city's rivers, constructing new sewer lines, building social housing units, and

managing solid waste disposal, among other activities.

Currently, 22,000 youths are already on-site following the official launch of the Regeneration Project by President Ruto. An additional 18,000 will join next month, complementing the thousands already employed at various sites where affordable housing units are under construction.

During his week-long development visit to Nairobi County, President Ruto urged the youth to enroll in the two-year project, emphasizing their

# State warns private hospitals sabotaging Taifa Care program

Sh10 million must provide verifiable supporting records for scrutiny,” he stated.

“Failure to do so will leave the government with no choice but to take serious action, including suspending the operations of non-compliant hospitals.

“If you hold a license to provide healthcare services but fail to do so, then you have no business operating,” he warned.

Kimtai said the ministry is fed up with private hospitals manipulating the system and vowed that such actions would no longer be tolerated.

Additionally, he questioned the timing of the claims, suggesting a deliberate attempt to discredit the SHA program.

“Why are these hospitals demanding payment for claims dating as far back as 2016? Why didn’t they pursue these claims earlier?” he asked.

He reiterated that the SHA program is designed to ensure all Kenyans—whether they visit public



or private hospitals—can access essential medical services without financial barriers.

The PS urged private hospitals to uphold their commitment to public health by offering outpatient services as required under SHA.

Kimtai also highlighted

the role of digital systems in increasing transparency in a process long plagued by opacity and manipulation.

“The government is determined to track every shilling, ensuring it reaches the right facilities and serves the people who need it most,” he said.

Meanwhile, the President’s Economic Advisor for Special Programs, Moses Kuria, stressed that under the SHA program, Kenyans are entitled to free primary medical services at government facilities.

He noted that in Embu

critical role in its success.

“We are creating job opportunities for our youth and women to ensure they have a source of income while contributing to national progress. The Climate WorX program currently employs 22,000 youths and is expanding to accommodate 18,000 more,” the President said.

He added, “We are not interested in the politics of hate, negative ethnicity, or discrimination based on tribe, religion, or origin. My duty as President is to unite leaders and citizens so we can focus on national development. This is the only way to improve agricultural production, build roads, expand electricity access, and strengthen our economy.”


Deputy President Kiithure Kindiki reaffirmed the government’s commitment to providing

employment opportunities for as many youths and women as possible through various initiatives, highlighting the regeneration program as a top priority.

“Our agenda as a government is to create jobs in every possible sector for our young people. That is why we are generating employment through affordable housing, the Nairobi Rivers Regeneration Project, and other initiatives such as Kazi Kwa Ground, Kazi Mtandaoni (online jobs through ICT hubs), and Kazi Majuu (overseas job opportunities),” DP Kindiki said.

He emphasized that national development is achievable only in a peaceful and united country, free from discrimination.

“We want a patriotic and unified nation. Now is the time to build a strong and cohesive country. We must put an end to all forms of discrimination for our nation to progress,” the DP stated.

# CS Kabogo urges Senate to shield ICT Ministry from budget cuts

The Ministry of Information, Communications, and the Digital Economy (MICDE) has been allocated less than half of its financial requirement for the 2025/2026 financial year, a shortfall that will negatively impact the implementation of key projects. Speaking before the Standing Committee on Information, Communication, and Technology, MICDE Cabinet Secretary William Kabogo Gitau stated that without adequate funding, the implementation of crucial government projects could be delayed. The CS was responding to the Senate committee's inquiries regarding the funding gaps facing the ministry. "There is a need to enhance the ministry's budget allocation to reduce financing gaps. This will help shorten the implementation period of projects," he said. He urged the committee to ring-fence the ministry's budget and consider

the financial shortfalls presented to ensure the timely implementation of planned programs. CS Kabogo, who was accompanied by Principal Secretaries Prof. Edward Kisiang'ani (Broadcasting and Telecommunications) and Eng. John Tanui (ICT and Digital Economy), noted that the restructuring of the state broadcaster, Kenya Broadcasting Corporation (KBC), and the Postal Corporation of Kenya (PCK), along with connectivity programs, is on course. However, funding cuts could potentially delay their implementation. The committee was informed that the ministry has been allocated Sh28 billion for the next financial year, significantly less than the Sh72 billion requested, leaving a deficit of Sh44 billion that is likely to impact planned projects. However, the CS said the ministry is engaging with the National Treasury to ensure funding for key programs is not affected. He briefed the commit-

tee on the ministry's priorities, which include: Providing 25,000 public Wi-Fi hotspots, establishing broadband connectivity and equipment in 1,450 hubs, facilitating training for youth to secure online jobs, laying 100,000 kilometers of fiber. Additionally, the ministry is keen on revamping the Kenya News Agency (KNA), rolling out broadcasting and telecommunications infrastructure in unserved and underserved areas, promoting mass media skills development through the Kenya Institute of Mass Communication (KIMC), and establishing digital content production centers under the Media Council of Kenya (MCK). He also highlighted efforts to ensure the sustainability of free public Wi-Fi hotspots, with plans to involve the public in their management. In his remarks, PS Tanui emphasized the government's plan to lay 100,000 kilometers of fiber to support digital hubs and enhance private-sector network coverage.

# Partnership to address skills mismatch

The State Department for Labour and Skills Development has signed a strategic partnership that will promote operationalisation of the National Sector Skills Committees. Principal Secretary for Labour and Skills Development, Mr. Shadrack Mwadime, and Alice Gugelev, the Chief Executive Officer of Global Development Incubator (GDI-Africa), signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in Nairobi. During the signing ceremony held at NSSF building, the Principal Secretary said the MOU would ensure the industry-led committees align skills supply with skills demand, thereby enhancing youth employability and economic growth. He appreciated the support from GDI-Africa, saying it will empower the National Sector Skills Committees to foster a demand driven skilled and employable youth workforce. "It will enable the industry-led committees to address the

skills mismatch that has contributed to high youth unemployment in Kenya and hence drive sustainable economic growth," he said. According to the Principal Secretary, the skills currently available do not adequately meet industry needs, creating a significant barrier to productivity and competitiveness in the economy. "The skills mismatch is a top policy concern, particularly considering the rapidly changing labour market dynamics. There is a growing consensus in both the industry and education sectors on the importance of aligning the supply of skills with demand to address this mismatch," he noted. He revealed that the skills mismatch has contributed to unemployment among educated individuals and long-term unemployment among the youth, indicating that the potential of young people to contribute to socio-economic development has therefore not been fully harnessed.

# Scholars push for Kiswahili as East Africa's official language

Scholars, publishers, and authors have petitioned the East African Community (EAC) Council of Ministers to fast-track the ratification of Kiswahili as the official language of the bloc to deepen regional integration.

The stakeholders, who attended the official opening of the Chama cha Wataaaluma wa Kiswahili Katika Vyuo Vikuu vya Afrika Mashariki (CHAWAKAMA)-Kenya Chapter's 21st conference, hosted at Egerton University, unanimously agreed that Kiswahili, as a lingua franca, could enhance economic development in East Africa. They noted that the language could facilitate trade, promote

cultural tourism, and foster a common identity, ultimately leading to increased economic opportunities and deeper regional integration.

Aduda emphasized that Kiswahili plays a crucial role in Africa and beyond in promoting peace, unity, socio-economic development, and cultural diversity.

He further stated that the conference, themed Kiswahili na Uchumi, aimed to promote the Kiswahili language by enhancing its function in raising awareness and fostering dialogue among millions of people globally.

In a speech delivered on his behalf by Senior Lecturer and Consultant at the Department of Peace Security and Social Studies, Prof. Eric Bor, the Deputy Vice Chancellor, said adoption of Kiswahili by EAC states would bolster trade, good governance, technology exchange, social integration and tourism among other things. Out of the eight partner states, only three, the United Republic of Tanzania, the Republic of Kenya, and the Republic of Uganda have adopted Kiswahili as an official language.

The Republic of Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, the Republic of Rwanda, the Federal Republic of Somalia, and the Republic of South Sudan are yet to adopt Kiswahili as an official language.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), in its 41st general conference, declared July 7th as Kiswahili Day.

According to UNESCO, Kiswahili is one of the most widely spoken languages in the world.

languages in the world.

The CHAWAKAMA-Kenya Chapter 21st conference also marked its anniversary, since its establishment.

Prof. Aduda indicated that as the African Continental Free Trade Agreement (AfCFTA) expands, Swahili would play a crucial role in business transactions and integration across borders within the region.

"Article 119 of the East African Community treaty says partner states shall promote the development and promotion of indigenous languages especially Kiswahili, as a lingua franca for the region," he explained.

The Deputy VC said the creative economy in the region was anchored on Kiswahili, which was being driven by East African youth as they speak and compose their music and movies in Kiswahili, adding that there was need to empower the youthful generation to contribute to the development of the region.

"Speaking Kiswahili is not a weakness; its richness shows its importance. If you're a Kiswahili speaker, be proud; not all people have the know-how and ability to speak Swahili," Prof. Aduda said.

The Deputy VC was delighted that there were East African scholars teaching Kiswahili in universities across the globe including the School of Oriental and African Studies, Bayreuth in Germany, St. Lawrence in USA, University of California, Osaka University in Japan with South Africa said to have recently incorporated Kiswahili in its school curriculum.

In East Africa alone, Kiswahili is spoken by more than 150 million people across Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda, Burundi, and the Democratic Republic of Congo. It is also the only African language used at the United Nations' Directorate of Global Communications.

Egerton University Deputy Vice-Chancellor for Academics, Research, and Extension, Prof. Bernard Aduda, noted that with over 230 million speakers worldwide, Kiswahili has the potential to serve as a common language for business and economic activities globally, enabling smoother communication and collaboration among traders and businesses across borders.

## Meru Polytechnic unveils project to curb post-harvest banana losses

Meru National Polytechnic has launched a groundbreaking project to combat post-harvest banana losses. The institution will process bananas into flour.

Spearheaded by the polytechnic's research team, the project aims to turn surplus bananas into high-value products while creating employment opportunities for youth and women in the banana value chain.

Research Coordinator Philip Karobia stated that the institution has partnered with farmers from Kariene and Nkubu to ensure the project's success. The collaboration

involves training farmers on proper post-harvest handling and value addition to maximize banana utilization. "This is a commercialized project with a developed prototype. We are awaiting certification and licensing, and we expect to have the product on the market by April," Karobia said. To make banana flour, the fruits are first sliced and then dried using solar or sun-drying methods to maintain a moisture content of 15 percent or below, ensuring long-term storage and preventing spoilage.

However, Karobia admitted that maintaining the moisture level has been a challenge due to a

lack of advanced drying equipment.

"Bananas contain 70 percent starch and small amounts of vitamins B and C. The peels, which are often discarded, are rich in potassium, an essential nutrient for the human body," he said, emphasizing the nutritional benefits for infants.

The flour can also be fortified by adding millet, sorghum, or stinging nettle to enhance its nutritional value.

"Instead of using traditional khaki packaging, we are developing a transparent package so that customers can see the product before purchasing," he explained.

#### PROCESSING OF ICT PRODUCTS IMPORT PERMITS

The Communications Authority of Kenya (CA), the regulatory agency for the ICT industry in Kenya, is responsible for the regulation of telecommunications, e-commerce, cyber security, broadcasting, and postal/ courier services. The Authority also manages the country's numbering and frequency spectrum resources, administers the Universal Service Fund (USF), and safeguards the interests of consumers of ICT services.

The Authority is also responsible for protecting consumer rights on communications platforms, managing competition within the sector to ensure a level playing ground for all players, and facilitating trade in ICT products through processing of Import Permits on the government's National Electronic Single Window System.

To enhance facilitation of trade on the said National Electronic Single Window System, the Authority wishes to bring to the attention of all stakeholders of the single window system the following requirements, which are essential for ensuring smooth processing of import permits for ICT products and systems:

1. License requirements : all importers of ICT products meant for sale are required to have the necessary license associated with the products they are importing into the country for sale.
2. Compliance certificate : all importers of ICT products meant for sale are required to attach a copy of the valid compliance certificate associated with the license they hold for which importation permit is being sought.
3. The attached invoice for the ICT products being imported must include the model number and quantity for purposes of confirming the Type Approval status of the ICT products and facilitating inspection and release from customs
4. Importers of ICT products are encouraged to cross reference the list of type-approved equipment on the Authority's website, at <https://www.ca.go.ke/licensee-register> and attach a screenshot of the specific model as per the list.
5. For internet connecting devices meant for sale in the country, importers are required to attach technical specifications confirming compliance with IPv6 requirements, as per the Authority's IPv6 Migration Strategy, found at <https://www.ca.go.ke/sector-guidelines?page=0>.

Importers are advised that additional information may be sought on a case by case basis depending on the complexity and novelty of non Type Approved ICT product being imported into the country for non commercial use.

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# NCA introduces sweeping changes with Building Code 2024

The National Construction Authority (NCA) has begun enforcing the newly enacted Building Code 2024. The code, which took effect on March 1st, replaces the outdated 1968 building regulations. It introduces stricter safety measures, promotes sustainable building practices, and streamlines approval processes to enhance structural integrity and prevent disasters caused by substandard construction.

NCA Nyanza Regional Coordinator Festus Mariera stated that repealing the 1968 code was long overdue, considering rapid urbanization and advancements in construction technologies that have transformed the industry.

Speaking in Kisumu during a sensitization meeting for stakeholders in the building sector, Mariera emphasized that the new code provides a comprehensive framework to ensure buildings meet modern safety and environmental standards.

He noted that the code incorporates emerging construction technologies and acknowledges new building materials that were unavailable when

the 1968 regulations were enacted.

“A lot has changed since 1968, which is why this new code was necessary. For instance, it now recognizes modern building materials, meaning it is no longer mandatory to source stones from Ndarugo,” he said.

Other aspects captured include electrical wiring and fibre optic network which were not captured in the old code.

The code, he added, further spells out stricter structural integrity checks, mandatory use of NCA certified materials and stronger penalties for violations.

He asked members of the public to acquaint themselves with the new code to ensure strict adherence to avoid conflict with the law.

“Before embarking on a project, you must ensure that you follow the regulations as set out in the Building Code 2024.

The contractors you engage must be compliant so that the quality of the building is not compromised,” he said.

The first round of the sensitisation meetings target 14 counties, with plans underway to reach the remaining counties as the new regulations take shape, he said.

Kisumu County Com-

missioner Benson Lepar-morijo said all National Government Administration Officers (NGAO) in the area have been sensitised on the new code and will work closely with NCA and other state agencies to ensure strict adherence.

Consistency in the implementation of the new code is essential to eliminate cases of buildings collapsing due to substandard and unprofessional works.

“We have had cases of buildings collapsing and even fire outbreaks in schools due to poor wiring because the work was done by quacks. In most cases evacuation is difficult because of the way the buildings have been constructed,” he said.

NGAO, he added, has adopted a multi-agency approach to check malpractice in the sector, adding that adequate security shall be given to NCA officers and county government officials to enforce the code.

Kisumu County Chief Officer in charge of Energy, Roads, Transport and Public Works Fred Osewe said the new code is critical in addressing emerging concerns in the construction industry which pose danger to members of the public.

Osewe said the county

government, which is tasked with the approval of building designs, has welcomed the new code and will ensure it is followed to the latter to guarantee safety of build-

ings.

“I want to make a commitment here that we will strive to ensure that all approvals are done as prescribed by the new code,” he said.

To ensure compliance, he added, county enforcement officers shall be deployed to ensure that any construction across the county has met the requirements of the law.

# Ministry flags off essential HIV supplies amid funding cuts

The Ministry of Health has flagged off a shipment of essential HIV supplies at the Mission for Essential Drugs and Supplies (MEDS) in a significant step towards strengthening Kenya's HIV response.

This comes at a crucial time as the country grapples with funding uncertainties, stigma, and supply chain challenges.

Speaking at the event, the Cabinet Secretary (CS) for Health, Dr. Deborah Barasa, underscored the government's commitment to ensuring uninterrupted access to life-saving HIV treatment and prevention resources.

"This milestone is a testament to our unwavering

dedication to safeguarding the health of people living with HIV, even as we navigate global funding constraints," she said.

The CS noted that Kenya has an estimated 1.4 million people living with HIV, and ensuring a steady supply of critical commodities is key to managing the epidemic.

She disclosed that the flagged-off consignment includes antiretroviral therapy (ART) drugs, HIV testing kits, early infant diagnosis reagents, viral load testing supplies, and male condoms.

According to Dr. Barasa, among the key highlights is the availability of 2,026,555 packs of ART at KEMSA and MEDS, with additional shipments expected to increase stocks

to over 11 months' supply by June 2025.

She further assured that pediatric formulations are also well stocked, with plans underway to

introduce a fixed-dose combination of Abacavir, Lamivudine, and Dolutegravir from August 2025 to enhance treatment for children.

Dr. Barasa emphasized the importance of the supplies, particularly for vulnerable groups such as infants at risk of vertical HIV transmission.

"Currently, we have over 510,000 bottles of Nevirapine suspension for infant prophylaxis, ensuring that newborns exposed to HIV get the best possible start in life," she added.

In addition to treatment, the Health CS noted that testing remains a cornerstone of Kenya's HIV response and that the country has fully transitioned to a three-test algorithm to enhance accuracy in HIV diagnosis.



She revealed that stock levels for testing kits are currently robust, with 8.3 million trinscreen tests available, translating to a 10-month supply as well as dual HIV/syphilis screening kits for antenatal care settings stand at 1.4 million tests, covering 14.5 months of demand.

Moreover, the CS echoed that the Ministry is also focusing on improving early infant diagnosis (EID) and viral load testing with Kenya having 18,432 EID tests in stock, and an additional 52,608 tests expected by April 2025 to ensure continued service delivery.

"Meanwhile, 446,436 viral load tests are available, covering 3.5 months of stock, with more reagents being expedited for delivery," she asserted.

Recognizing the role of preventive measures, she said the Ministry has also prioritized the distribution of male condoms, with over 1.6 million pieces currently available and an additional 93 million under procurement.

The CS expressed that despite this progress, challenges remain, particularly in ensuring supply chain continuity in remote areas, addressing stigma, and digitizing drug distribution systems.

# Government launches Digischool Internet project in Machakos

The Ministry of Information, Communications and the Digital Economy, in partnership with Huawei and UNESCO, has launched phase two Digischool Internet projects at the Machakos School for the Deaf to expand on internet connectivity and inclusion in schools.

Principal Secretary for ICT, Engineer John Tanui, who presided over the event on behalf of ICT Cabinet Secretary William Kabogo, said the launch was part of the government's plan of integrating technology into education and ensuring all students, especially those with special needs, are equipped in digital learning through reliable internet.

He said they have provided them with video conferencing solutions to ensure special needs students are connected and to ensure that Kenya Institute of Special Education (KISE) can teach several schools from one location.

"We took a bold step in ensuring every learner, including those in special needs schools have access to digital opportunities thus empowering students with digital skills and bridging the digital divide," Tanui said.

Tanui affirmed that the several digital hubs deployed in the country are to enable young people to learn and access jobs online that would cater for their needs while encouraging entrepreneurship.

He noted that the

ministry is collaborating with the private sector to fill the gap in the provision of resources that the government cannot cover and ensure the whole country is connected.

"We cannot deliver alone as a government, we are working with the private sector to ensure we connect our people and utilize all available solutions to ensure every part of the country is connected," the PS noted.

Present was Huawei Deputy CEO, Stephen Zhang, who echoed the PS's remarks adding that internet connectivity is improving the efficiency of education management as it assists teachers access management systems online while improving access to education resources and making learning more interesting and effective.

Zhang pointed out that through the partnership, they have connected other special needs schools in Migori and Tana River Counties with internet and video conferencing facilities and they could then access services at KISE, which has guided experts in providing assessment and rehabilitation services remotely.

"Huawei's Tech4ALL inclusive, aims to enable an inclusive and sustainable digital

world and together with our partners we are committed to emerging technologies and solutions that make the world a more sustainable space for all," Zhang said.

UNESCO Regional Director for Eastern Africa, Louise Haxthausen said access to the internet opens doorways to unlimited wealth of relevant information, knowledge and educational resources which expands educational opportunities in and beyond the classroom.

Haxthausen disclosed that having the internet is not enough and learning institutions should utilize the internet to improve the quality of teaching and learning through the provision of free digital education content and invest more in accessible technology and universal designs to open more opportunities for learners with disabilities.

He said the first phase of the project connected 13 schools to the internet, benefitting 6,000 learners, while the second phase has so far connected 21 schools to the internet and has benefited 10,000 learners, and will soon be embarking on phase three to include six special needs schools.

He, however, noted that the cost of equipping schools with ICT devices and providing affordable internet is a major investment challenge which requires a broad strategic partnership and cooperation from all stakeholders because the benefits are high and impactful.

# Government to establish specialized college for correctional officers

The Government will establish a premier institution, the Kenya Correctional Service College, to provide training on correctional service matters.

The college, which will operate under the State Department for Correctional Services, will offer teaching, training, and innovative research in correctional education and development.

According to the technical committee vice chairperson, Senior Assistant Commissioner General of Prisons and Commandant at the Prisons Staff Training College, Angus Masoro, the college is part of the recommendations in the Correctional Service Bill, 2025, which is currently undergoing public validation.

“This does not mean we will do away with the Prisons Staff Training Col-

lege, but we aim to professionalize the correctional service. Over the years, we have been sending our staff to other universities and institutions, including the Kenya School of Government, for training,” he said.

“We shall also be able to attract other personnel to train in our college and stamp our authority as correctional services,” he said.

Speaking in Kakamega

town during a public validation forum, Masoro said the proposed bill on policy and regulatory framework also seeks to merge the Prison Service, Probation and After-care Service to become the Department of Correctional Service.

Masoro said the controversial issue of conjugal visits for inmates in prison has once again come into the spotlight.

“The hot debate on this subject has not been ad-

dressed fully in the regulations, neither in the previous law nor in the proposed policy,” he added.

“There is also the general feeling that intersex, who are being confined within one institution but separately from male and female, should be accommodated in their own institution,” he added.

Probation Officer and a member of the Technical Committee on the Development of the Legal and Policy Framework for the Correctional Service, Mr. Michael Matekwa, said the legal and policy mandate in the field had not been reviewed for about 100 years.

“This is a window of opportunity to align the laws we are making to both the constitution of 2010, the international instruments and the good practice in the offender management,” he said.

## Lesotho’s King praises Kenya’s school meals programme

The King of Lesotho, King Letsie III, commended the Government of Kenya for its commitment to the school meals program.

Speaking in Nairobi after a benchmarking tour in Ruiru, Kiambu County, the King and his entourage, accompanied by the President of the African Development Bank, Dr. Akinwumi Adesina, and officials from the Ministry of Education, were impressed by the accomplishments of the country’s school feeding program. “African governments can integrate school feeding into their national fabric to nurture minds for a better future for our continent,” the King said, adding that African leaders should take the lead in championing school feeding programs to end hunger among school-age children.

King Letsie III acknowledged young philanthropists such as Kenyan Wawira Njiru, the founder of Food for Education, who was recognized as the United Nations Person of the Year in October 2021 for pioneering nutrition-based start-ups and inspiring the scaling up of impactful school feeding programs.

Dr Adesina on his part derided unhealthy stunted growth of most African children occasioned by malnutrition saying, it was a leadership issue, and governments should invest in education, hence a sustainable future for the African continent and beyond. He called for mainstreaming and advocacy for all children to eat well since an empty stomach can interfere with the cognitive ability of the brain to grasp educational content among other concepts.

Kenya Railways has recorded an increase in passenger numbers boarding and alighting at Voi Station since the introduction of a stopover for the Madaraka Express passenger night train in December 2024.

“In addition to the previous stopovers at 18:48 hrs from Nairobi and 16:36 hrs from Mombasa with the afternoon train, the newly introduced three-minute stopover at 02:05 hrs from Nairobi and 11:45 hrs from Mombasa has unlocked vast potential for local businesses and tourism,” Mainga said.

He added that the Standard Gauge Railway (SGR), through the Madaraka Express Passenger Service, is not just a mode of transport but also a catalyst for economic growth.

According to Mainga, taxi drivers in Voi are now benefiting from the steady influx of passengers at the station. What might have seemed like a minor adjustment is now creating significant ripples in tourism, employment, and investment, all at the doorstep of this

bustling town. From tourists eager to explore Tsavo National Park—one of Kenya’s oldest and largest national parks—to those experiencing the region’s cultural heritage, the stopover is proving invaluable. It is also generating both direct and indirect employment opportunities for locals, he said.

“For many, railways conjure images of trains lumbering along tracks. But for Kenya Railways, it is a symbol of development, resilience, and transformation for the nation,” the director concluded.

Mainga added that discussions between Kenya Railways and the Taita-Taveta County Government on rehabilitation of the 130-kilometer Meter Gauge Railway line from Voi to Taveta are at an advanced stage.

The line, which has been dormant since 2006 will connect Tanzania at the Holili border and holds an enormous promise for regional growth, he added.

The Voi- Taveta railway line will connect Kenya to Tanzania’s Moshi region, opening a direct link to one of East

Africa’s most important tourist hubs, Mount Kilimanjaro, the MD added.

With feasibility studies already completed, the project will boost regional tourism and strengthen economic ties between the two countries, he said.

Mainga said the development of the Voi-Taveta railway line will create an integrated freight system complete with Meter Gauge Railway (MGR) and Standard Gauge Railway (SGR) trans-shipment facilities at Voi and MGR-SGR cargo handling at Taveta.

“This development will result in increased trade, higher volumes of goods moving seamlessly between Kenya and Tanzania and a more efficient and reliable freight network that benefits industries across the region boosting the significant role the Kenya Railways plays in contributing three per cent of Kenya’s GDP,” he said.

“The ongoing efforts to expand services, revitalize old routes and integrate more technology reflect the company’s drive to stay ahead in a competitive and fast-paced world,” he added.

He added that the rapid changes where industries and economies must constantly adapt to survive, Kenya Railways is keeping pace with global progress by connecting cities, counties, countries and opening opportunities.

# Wajir Residents turn to livestock restocking after abandoning charcoal trade

Wajir County residents, who once depended on charcoal burning for survival, have abandoned the practice and are now seeking support to restore their livelihoods through alternative income sources.

Their appeal is part of a broader effort to protect and rehabilitate grazing lands that have suffered years of deforestation and environmental degradation.

Communities from Ganyure, Wagalla, and Shanta Abaq in Wajir West Constituency, along with residents from Tarbaj Constituency, recently surrendered their axes and machetes to the Rangeland Management Committees. They are now urging the government and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to step in and provide sustainable economic opportunities.

Ahmed Abdisalan, a former charcoal burner from Shanta Abaq, said years of tree felling had pushed the already fragile environment to the brink, worsening the effects of recurrent droughts.

“We decided to quit charcoal burning after being sensitized by the Rangeland Management Committee. The destruction was driven by desperation—we had no other means of survival after losing our livestock to drought,” he said. He called on the county and national governments, as well as NGOs, to support them in transitioning to alter-

native livelihoods.

Ismail Yussuf, another resident who surrendered his tools, echoed this sentiment, urging authorities to assist them in securing stable income sources.

“Charcoal burning has wreaked havoc on our environment, but we had no choice after losing our animals. I have children in secondary school who need fees, and my family needs food. A livestock restocking programme would be a lifeline for us,” he said.

Many other former charcoal burners from Wajir West and Tarbaj Constituencies have joined the call for livestock restocking, citing it as the most viable way to rebuild their livelihoods.

Wagalla Ward Administrator, a member of the Rangeland Management Committee which includes county government officials, chiefs, elders, and Kenya Forest Service (KFS) representatives commended the residents for their decision to abandon charcoal burning.

“This practice has been a major driver of environmental destruction, threatening an already fragile ecosystem. By giving up their tools, these residents have taken a crucial step towards restoring our rangelands,” he said, holding up a handful of surren-

dered axes and pangas.

He reassured the community that efforts are underway to support them in finding sustainable livelihoods.

Mohamed Macash Saman, Chairman of the Tarbaj Rangeland Management Committee, praised the former charcoal burners and pledged to work closely with them in environmental conservation efforts.

He noted that the committee had intensified awareness campaigns on the dangers of deforestation and climate change.

Speaking at Shomageri in Tarbaj, he highlighted the devastating impact of charcoal burning, which has not only led to massive deforestation but also increased the frequency of bushfires.

Tarjab Sub-County Kenya Forest Service Officer, Samwel Embenywa, also lauded the community’s efforts to curb environmental destruction.

He warned that drought, coupled with unchecked tree felling, posed a severe threat to the region’s already diminishing forest cover.

As Wajir grapples with the long-term effects of deforestation and climate change, the call for livestock restocking and alternative economic support grows louder.

Residents now look to authorities and development partners for tangible solutions to secure their future without resorting to environmentally harmful practices.

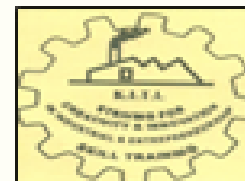

# Health officials deploy drones to combat malaria in Busia county

The Department of Health and Sanitation, in collaboration with the End Malaria Council, has launched the third phase of larval management at the source in Akirimasit, Amukura West Ward, Teso Central Sub-County.

This initiative aims to mitigate the high malaria prevalence in Busia County, which has the highest rate in Kenya.

It comes at a critical time as Busia County continues to experience malaria prevalence rates six times higher than the national average and three times higher than other lake-endemic counties.

At the beginning of last year, Busia County recorded the highest malaria prevalence rate at 39 per cent, six times higher than the national average and three times higher than other lake-endemic counties.

As a result, a robust anti-malaria campaign was launched using drones to administer biolarvicide—

an insecticide that targets mosquito larvae, killing them before they mature into adults, thereby reducing malaria transmission.

This innovative approach is efficient especially in accessing unreachable breeding grounds such as swampy areas.

Speaking at Akirimasit in Amukura West Ward, Deputy Governor Arthur Odera stated that they have made significant progress in reducing malaria transmission through the collective efforts of indoor residual spraying, distribution of treated mosquito nets and use of drones' technology.

"We have drastically managed to reduce the transmission of malaria in Busia County through our collective efforts by incorporating all the means necessary to combat the high rate of malaria," Odera said.

In support of his statement, Chief Officer for Public Health Susan Outa emphasized that they would bring Community

Health Promoters (CHPs) on board to further enhance the fight against malaria.

Moreover, she urged Busia residents to observe malaria prevention measures by sleeping under treated mosquito nets.

"Despite our efforts to end malaria, I urge the residents of Busia to ensure their safety by sleeping under treated mosquito nets," Outa stated.

According to the Secretary to End Malaria Council Dr. Willis Afwande, the previous phase treated approximately 17,000 hectares of breeding ground, resulting in a remarkable 95 per cent reduction in adult mosquito populations that would have caused infections.

The County Malaria Control Coordinator Valerian Karani revealed that about 40 per cent of all outpatient visits in Busia Health facilities were due to malaria, with two per cent of deaths attributed to severe cases.

# Women root for empowerment of female artisanal miners

A league of women has embarked on an initiative aimed at empowering other women working in the mining industry. Mary Alwany, a widow and mother of four, is defying the odds by championing the rights of artisanal small-scale miners, particularly women. As a respected leader within the mining com-


munity, she has been a steadfast advocate for safer and healthier working conditions, ensuring that the voices of women miners are heard and their concerns addressed. A true gender champion, Ms. Alwany reflects on her journey, which began in 1995 when she first ventured into mining in Ikolomani, Shinyalu, and Lurambi sub-counties. Through resilience and determination, she con-

tinues to pave the way for a more equitable and inclusive mining industry. “The challenges women face in the mining industry are immense. Before becoming a gender champion, I experienced these challenges firsthand. Exposure to harmful chemicals such as mercury not only affects our lungs and skin but also impacts our reproductive health,” she stated. Ms. Alwany says many

women have given birth to stillborn babies due to the processing of gold ore which involved crushing and cleaning the crushed ore powder to extract the gold amalgam. “The knowledge gap is quite broad for many women lacking basic education. With this vulnerability, more women are endangered in their line of work,” Ms. Alwany adds. She said in the artisanal and small-scale mining

(ASM) sector, women struggle with limited access to finance, equipment, and formalized markets, restricting their economic empowerment and transformation. Ms. Alwany stated the environmental impacts of extractive activities and climate change disproportionately affect women in mining communities, as they bear the burden of resource depletion and environmental degrada-

tion. “Addressing these challenges requires intentional reforms, including gender-inclusive policies, workplace protections, financial support mechanisms,” added she. Her motivation to fight for women’s rights started in 2016 when she recognized the limited opportunities and unfair treatment faced by women in the industry.

# Engineering student innovates portable stalls for mobile vendors

Starting a stall business requires careful planning, a strong understanding of the market, and a commitment to providing exceptional customer service.

Perhaps for this reason, a mechanical engineering student at Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology (MMUST) has invented a unique collapsible structure that vendors can use to display their groceries.

In an interview, Kaguru Njoroge Muchina, the pioneer of Flexi Stalls, explains that these new structures are made of wood for support and partitioning, as well as metal

for the grills that hold the goods. “Compared to other grocery kiosks, Flexi Stalls are more hygienic, presentable, and portable, making them efficient and reliable for mobile vendors,” he observes.

The stalls are priced between Sh1,500 and Sh3,500, depending on size.

Muchina says he started the business with a capital of Sh100,000, which he obtained through a seed fund from his former school under a program known as “Aspire.” This financial support enabled him to launch the business.

He describes his venture as vision-driven and looks forward to expanding it

once he attains financial stability after completing his studies.

Muchina currently has no employees but works with fellow students who volunteer their time to help him.

He recalls that the idea started as a school project, which gradually evolved into a business after consultations with the relevant authorities.

“Being a new product in the market, there are challenges associated with it. Even though it is a good and reliable structure, many people have yet to embrace it,” he says.

“They are used to traditional wooden kiosks and polythene coverings and

are hesitant to try something new,” he adds.

Since launching the business, he has made only a few sales, but customer feedback has been positive and encouraging.

To attract and retain customers, Muchina offers flexible payment options. For those unable to pay upfront, he rents out the stalls at affordable rates based on demand.

Additionally, he provides delivery services, ensuring that customers receive the stalls and later

collects them after use.

However, despite their flexibility, the stalls are heavy and cannot be transported over long distances, which limits their market reach.

“This is a major challenge in terms of transportation and marketing since moving the stalls over long distances requires financial resources,” he explains.

To address this, Muchina has developed a marketing strategy where he takes pictures of the stalls, prints them, and uses them for advertising.

“Although this method helps, it is not entirely effective because many people prefer to see the actual structure and understand how it works rather than just hearing about it,” he adds. Among other issues such as lack of electricity, inadequate funds, inadequate manpower, expensive cost of raw materials and the fact that he is a student, are the major limitations for him.

# New energy policy targets universal electricity clean cooking by 2030

The Ministry of Energy and Petroleum has developed two draft policies to align the sector with global best practices and accelerate economic growth.

The Draft National Energy Policy 2025 aims to fast-track the country's transition to a sustainable, inclusive, and resilient energy future.

The policy seeks to provide affordable, reliable, and sustainable energy to drive national development, economic growth, and climate resilience.

It targets universal electricity access by 2030, with a particular focus on marginalized communities in rural and remote areas.

This goal will be achieved through grid expansion, off-grid solutions, and the integration of renewable energy technologies. Additionally, the policy aims to ensure universal access to clean cooking by 2030, reducing reliance on traditional biomass fuels and promoting cleaner, healthier alternatives.

It also seeks to harness Kenya's vast renewable energy resources—including geothermal, solar, wind, and bioenergy—to expand the country's renewable energy capacity and ensure that these sources contribute significantly to the national energy mix.

According to the Ministry of Energy, the Policy will position the country to lead in geothermal development, capitalizing on its geographical advantage and renewable potential to enhance energy security, spur green industrialization and contribute to global climate goals.

It will promote ener-

gy-efficient appliances, supporting electric mobility and enhancing energy conservation. The policy highlights the importance of securing sustainable financing to meet the energy sector's infrastructure needs by fostering public-private partnerships.

The integration of emerging technologies, such as smart grids and artificial intelligence, will further enhance energy system efficiency and service delivery. In line with the Paris Agreement, the Policy aims to decarbonize the energy sector by 2050. It aims to promote decentralized energy solutions like mini-grids and micro-grids and ensures equitable access to clean energy across the country.

Speaking during a public participation forum for the six Coastal counties held at the Kenya School of Government, Mombasa, Secretary for Renewable Energy Engineer Isaac Kiva reiterated the government's commitment to universal access to electricity by 2030.

Eng. Kiva disclosed that the current electrification coverage stands at 75 per cent from both grid and off grid stations.

"We have come up with projects which will accelerate electrification. In grid areas, it is much easier because we extend the power either through the Kenya Power and Lighting Company or through the Rural Electrification and Renewable Energy Corporation," he stated.

"Off-grid areas are

more challenging because of the vastness of the areas; they are far from the national grid and what we did there is to come up with an initiative to supply power to those off-grid stations using mini-grids and solar system," he added.

Eng. Kiva noted that the World Bank-funded Kenya Off-Grid Solar Access Project aims to reach underserved counties.

"A few weeks ago, we were able to sign contracts to do mini grids to those areas for projects worth almost Sh10 billion," stated Eng. Kiva.

Kilifi County Director of Energy, Wilfred Baya, lauded the development of the policy, saying that many off-grid hospitals and the adoption of solar panels is a timely solution.

Adoption of solar powered streetlights and flood lights in urban areas, he noted we will improve security, and Kenyans will be able to do businesses 24 hours thus accelerating economic growth.

"This policy is one of the best the country has ever had, and I believe it will create the change that we aspire to as per Kenya's vision 2030," stated the Director of Energy.

On the other hand, the overarching aim of the Draft National Petroleum Policy, 2025 is to explore, exploit, utilize and manage petroleum resources and products sustainably to contribute towards Kenya's economic development.

The Policy will also promote sustainable petroleum resource exploration, development and production, enhance storage and transportation capacity of petroleum products, promote value addition of petroleum re-

sources for local and regional petroleum product demand and enhance the uptake of Liquefied Petroleum Gas.

Engineer Kishoyian Saigulu from the State Department of Petroleum,

expounded that the policy will promote sustainable development in Kenya's upstream sector and ensure security of supply for the country and the regional markets.

"It also aims to pro-

mote the use of LPG; we recently launched the National LPG Growth Strategy that aims to increase the consumption of LPG per capita use from 7.5 per cent to 15 per cent," stated Eng. Saigulu.

# TAX AMNESTY

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

### A. GENERAL OVERVIEW

#### What is the Tax Amnesty 2024?

This is a Tax Amnesty introduced through an amendment to the Tax Procedures Act by the Tax Procedures (Amendment) Act, 2024. It is an amnesty on interest, penalties and fines on tax debts for periods up to 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023 provided that one settles all the principal taxes by 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025. The amnesty seeks to encourage compliance, relieve taxpayers of historical penalties and to support revenue collection.

#### When does the amnesty run?

The amnesty commenced on 27<sup>th</sup> December, 2024 and shall run up to 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025.

### B. ELIGIBILITY & COVERAGE

#### Who qualifies?

- 1. Automatic Eligibility:** For taxpayers with no outstanding principal taxes for periods up to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2023 but owing interest/penalties, an application for amnesty will not be required. The penalties, interest and fines will be waived automatically through the system.
- 2. Eligibility Upon Payment:** Taxpayers with outstanding principal taxes for periods up to 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023, will be required to pay the unpaid principal taxes in full by 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025 or enter into a payment plan. The payments under the payment plan must be finalized by 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025. The application shall be done via iTax.
- 3. Others:** Self-assessments/amended returns for pre-2024 periods (even if raised after 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023) and Tax disputes (e.g., objections, court cases) resolved and settled by 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025.

#### What taxes are covered?

The tax amnesty covers interest, penalties and fines on taxes imposed by the tax laws as defined in the Tax Procedures Act.

#### What is excluded?

- Fines unrelated to tax debt (e.g. fraud, non-tax offenses).
- Penalties/interest for periods after 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023.

### C. APPLICATION PROCESS

#### How do I apply?

For taxpayers with unpaid principal taxes:

1. Log into iTax: Navigate to Debt and Enforcement > Amnesty Application.
2. Select tax periods: System auto-populates eligible debts. Taxes under dispute should be excluded from the payment plan by unchecking boxes.
3. Choose payment method:
  - Pay in full, OR
  - Propose a payment plan (installments must end by 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025).
4. Submit application: Amnesty is granted after final payment for each period

Note: There are no documents required.

#### What if I have already paid my principal taxes?

Tax Amnesty is granted immediately all principal taxes are paid, returns filed, and no disputes exist. Amnesty certificates are emailed to the iTax registered email address.

#### What if I disagree with KRA's debt calculation?

Contact your Tax Service Office (TSO) for debt reconciliation. Ensure you provide the necessary supporting documents (e.g., payment receipts, objection decisions).

### D. PAYMENT PLANS

#### Is it possible to make use of a payment plan?

Yes, it is. However, all the payments under the payment plan must be made by 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2025. Defaulting on a payment plan voids the amnesty since the unpaid amounts as per the payment plan incur penalties/interest.

How it works:

1. Propose installment frequency in iTax.
2. System auto generates the plan if compliant with the deadline.

# Hope for kidney patients as JOOTRH prepares for transplant procedures

The Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Teaching and Referral Hospital (JOOTRH) has announced plans to begin performing kidney transplants later this year to address the growing demand for renal care in the Lake region.

The move comes amid concerns over the rising number of patients on dialysis and the increasing pressure on health facilities in the area.

JOOTRH Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Dr. Richard Lesiyampe stated that with the facility's elevation to a Level 6A National Referral Hospital, plans are underway to expand the renal unit and introduce kidney transplants to improve the lives of kidney patients.

The transplant services, he said, will be offered in collaboration with a consortium of highly skilled doctors and specialists from across the Lake region.

"We have highly qualified and experienced consultants in this region. That is why JOOTRH is partner-

ing with specialists from Maseno University, other health facilities, and, if necessary, experts from other parts of the country to roll out this service," he said.

He added that the partnership will bring together professionals to ensure that patients receive the highest

quality of care before, during, and after the transplant procedure.

Addressing the media in Kisumu during World Kidney Day celebrations, Dr. Lesiyampe emphasized that regional collaboration will also enhance knowledge sharing and skill development among healthcare workers, ultimately improving the overall quality of care in the region.

"We are bringing together the best minds in the Lake region to ensure that kidney transplant procedures at JOOTRH meet the highest standards.

"This is not just about offering a service; it is about building capacity within our region to provide high-quality healthcare that can compete with the best in the country,"

he added. Currently, many patients in need of kidney transplants, he said, are forced to travel long distances to hospitals in Nairobi and outside the country, placing an additional burden on them both financially and emotionally.

"The introduction of kidney transplant services at JOOTRH will significantly improve access to life-saving treatments for patients suffering from kidney failure, who previously had to seek transplant services far from home. This initiative will be a game-changer not only for Kisumu County but for the entire Lake region," he said.

He said the hospital has already begun preparations to ensure the successful launch of the transplant

program.

These include setting up a specialized renal unit where 17 state-of-the-art dialysis machines have been installed.

Additionally, the hospital, he said, has employed a nephrologist and a team of specialist nurses to run the unit.

Kidney failure, he said, is a big health concern in Kisumu and the neighbouring countries, with many people suffering from conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, and kidney diseases which ultimately lead to renal failure.

"In Kisumu alone we have about 350 patients in renal care with 60 of them on dialysis at JOOTRH. This paints a picture of how the situation is in the region," he said.

# KENAS strengthening regulation to enhance competence

Kenya Accreditation Service (KENAS) has reiterated its resolve to collaborate with regulators in efforts geared towards accrediting their processes and embedding competence and trust across various sectors to safeguard consumers. KENAS CEO Dr. Walter Ongeti emphasized the crucial role of accreditation in strengthening regulatory frameworks. “Accreditation ensures regulatory reliability, fosters trust by guaranteeing competence, impartiality, and compliance with international standards,” he noted.

Speaking during the Kenya-UK Workshop on Regulatory Development Tools in Policymaking held in Nairobi, Dr Ongeti said the workshop aimed to foster knowledge exchange and strengthen regulatory by sharing best practices in accreditation, standards, and technical regulations. The workshop provided a platform to share insights and case studies on integrating accreditation and standards into regulatory frameworks.


During the event, Dr. Ongeti highlighted the collaborative journey KENAS has undertaken with regulators, accrediting their processes and embedding competence and trust across various sectors. He shared examples such as the partnership with the National Transport and Safety Authority (NTSA), where conformity assessment for bus body construction under KS 372:2019 must be conducted by a KENAS-accredited body.

Similarly, the Kenya National Highways Authority (KeNHA) requires accreditation for inspection bodies handling axle load inspections, while the Energy and Petroleum Regulatory Authority (EPRA) mandates accreditation for petroleum road tanker inspections. Additionally, under the Business Laws Amendment Act 2024, the Kenya Bureau of Standards (KEBS) must ensure its laboratories are accredited by KENAS to issue valid test certificates.

“Future opportunities for accreditation integration with regulators include the Nuclear Regulation Act (2019), which requires that testing and evaluation for uranium, thorium, and other radioactive elements be conducted by laboratories accredited to ISO/IEC 17025,” said Dr Ongeti. Likewise, he said that the National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) will designate reference laboratories that must meet ISO/IEC 17025 standards for environmental testing.

PSC champions for State Parties Assessment Tool (SPAT)

By adopting SPAT, Kenya is taking a bold step in aligning with global best practices, ensuring that public service is synonymous with transparency and accountability,” Muturi said.

The workshop, supported by the African Union Commission (AUC), brought together directors and heads of human resource management from various government ministries.

Muturi stressed that beyond piloting the tool, public servants must internalize and uphold the values of the African Charter on Public Service and Administration in their daily work.

“We must not just adopt this tool; we must live the values it represents. Public Service must be built on trust, equity, and efficiency. Kenya is more than capable of achieving the objectives laid out in this Charter,” he added.

Kenya joins Namibia, Tanzania, and South Africa in piloting SPAT, reinforcing its leadership in public service transformation.

Muturi urged the AUC to refine and digitalize the SPAT tool to enhance accessibility and strengthen peer learning among member states.

He reiterated Kenya’s unwavering commitment to upholding the values of the African Charter, ensuring a public service sector that is accountable, transparent, and efficient.

“Kenya remains at the forefront of public service transformation, and we will lead by example. Through cooperation, commitment, and shared values, we are building a service-oriented government that truly serves its people,” he said.

The outgoing Principal Secretary for Public Service Mr. Amos Gatheca echoed the CS’s sentiments, calling for proactive implementation of the tool within government ministries.

“I urge participants of this sensitization conference to create champions in your ministries who will implement this tool. We look forward to seeing how SPAT will contribute to shaping service delivery across the continent,” Gatheca stated.

The adoption of SPAT marks a significant milestone in Kenya’s governance reforms, with the Public Service leading efforts to institutionalize best practices for enhanced service delivery across the public sector.

# State sets up 1,105 new Administrative Units to boost service delivery

The Government has established 1,105 administrative units. These comprise of 24 new sub counties, 88 divisions, 318 locations and 675 sub-locations in a move aimed at enhancing governance, security and service delivery across the country. These will be operationalized during the Financial Year 2024/25, said Internal Security Principal Secretary Dr Raymond Omollo.

Speaking during an Administration and Internal Security departmental committee meeting regarding the implementation and operationalization of newly gazetted administrative units, the PS said the Ministry of Interior is establishing a formal policy guiding the process. He said a Cabinet memorandum on the guidelines has been drafted and will soon be presented to the Cabinet for approval. "The Ministry has been operationalizing new units based on key parameters, including security concerns, administrative anomalies, population size, and minority representation," the PS pointed out. Regions experiencing persistent security threats have been prioritized for administrative units establishment. This will ensure the deployment of officers to coordinate security and development efforts in the volatile areas. The creation of the units will also address instances of administrative inefficiencies such as

imbalanced jurisdictional coverage. The creation of the units was also informed by population density and land size to improve governance and service delivery. PS Omollo added that the units have been created to address the interests of minority communities.

# Sh55-million earth dam commissioned in Kibwezi East

At least 7,800 residents of the Ulinzi and Ngwata Locations in Masongaleni Ward will benefit from the rehabilitated Uyi Earth Dam, gaining access to clean water for domestic use and for watering their animals.

The Sh55-million earth dam which was commissioned by the Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASAL) and Regional Development Principal Secretary (PS) Kello Harsama and Makueni Governor Mutula Kilonzo will also serve 8,000 cattle and 15,000 goats.

The State Department of ASAL and Regional Development through the National Drought Management Authority (NDMA) Makueni invested Sh39 million that was used to desilt, expand the embankment and check dams.

Also, some of the money was spent on installation of solar-pumping draw-off system, construction of composite water treatment filter and construction of gravitational dosing unit and supply of water treatment chemicals and installation of 1,216 metres chain link fence.

The County Government of Makueni also invested Sh9.99 million on 5.6-kilometre pipeline, construction of two water kiosks and installation of 10,000 litres tank on six-metre towers, construction of 50 cubic metres water tank at the treatment facility and water connections to Yikita and Yikivuthi Primary Schools and Yikita Secondary School.

On the other hand, the community contributed Sh5 million through donated land, materials, and labour which is a demonstration of true ownership and commitment to sustainable water solutions.

“Our steadfast mission is to accelerate socio-economic progress in regions like Makueni. Our focus is on strengthening resilience to drought and food insecurity through sustainable interventions such as

water infrastructure projects, drought resistant agriculture, and livelihood diversifications,” Harsama said.

“Through NDMA, we have been working closely with county governments and communities to implement practical solutions. The rehabilitation of Uyi Earth Dam is a prime example of what we can achieve through partnership and shared responsibility, aligning with the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA),” the PS said.

Harsama disclosed that the dam has reduced the distance women went to fetch water to use in their families and to water animals to five kilometres from 15 kilometres.

He also challenged them to use the water maximally especially by starting kitchen gardens and other ventures that can improve their living standards. He called upon the stakeholders to embrace proper water governance, maintain the facility and conserve the water catchment area for posterity.

“As we celebrate this achievement, we must also acknowledge the responsibility that comes with it. Sustainable management of the dam is crucial to ensuring that it continues to serve the community for generations to come. Together we can safeguard this investment and maximize its benefits,” he said.

He promised that through NDMA, some money will be factored in the next financial year budget to expand the dam further with a view to reaching more people in the other deserving areas.

Besides, the PS said that each of the 10 sub counties in Makueni County will receive 300 bags of maize and 260 bags of beans respectively from next week.

On his part, Governor Mutula said it was his goal to have a dam in every ward, noting that issues of gender-based violence were related to lack of water.

# Outgoing NPS Commission enumerates achievements

The 2nd Police Service Commission, whose term came to an end last week, has enumerated its achievements in the last six years of its term. Presenting a report to President William Ruto at Statehouse, Nairobi, the chairperson Eliud Kinuthia said in the period, the Commission recruited 10,932 new police officers to bring the police to population ratio to 1:509. “Further, we recruited 1,128 civilian staff of the National Police Service. On promotions of staff, we promoted 16,338 police officers and 1,309 civilian staff. On disciplinary control, the Commission determined 1,461 disciplinary cases and processed 724 appeals,” he said. The Commission also designed an automated Police Recruitment Information Technology System to reduce human contact and interaction during the entire process of police recruitment. The system maps corruption-prone stages in the process of recruitment such as manual shortlisting, academic documents examination, medical

examination, and has devised an intervention that will reduce vulnerability to corruption for youths seeking police jobs. The system has been presented to the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and National Administration Hon. Kipchumba Murkomen. According to Kinuthia, even as the 2nd Commission exits, there are several key recommendations that it proposes including the review of remuneration and other terms and conditions of service to boost the morale of police officers. “The Commission has implemented Phase I and II of the salary increment. This has caused the basic salary of a Police Constable to increase from Sh21,645 to Sh25,645. “The longest-serving Police Constable who has served 20 notches, equivalent to twenty years, now earns a basic salary of Kshs. 69,640. Similarly, for senior officers, the basic salary of a Senior Assistant Inspector General (SAIG) was increased from Sh200,889 to Sh221,915 per month with the longest serving SAIG rank earning up to Sh409,365

per month,” Kinuthia stated. He called for the implementation of Phase III of the salary increment, which is projected to further raise the basic salary of a police constable from Sh25,645 to Sh29,645 per month. The report highlighted key challenges encountered by the Commission, including irregular police recruitment, budgetary constraints, the need for a sustainable police welfare program, police professionalism, the role of civilian professionals within the National Police Service and governance issues. “Numerous governance disputes during the Commission tenure of office have led to frequent down-time whose net effect is wastage and loss of valuable time at the expense of service delivery,” Kinuthia said. As the curtain fell on the Commission, the Chairperson expressed gratitude to the President for the opportunity to serve and acknowledged his steadfast support in defending the Commission during governance challenges. President William Ruto commended the Commis-

sion for its contributions to police reforms and its stewardship of human resource management in the National Police Service. He noted that the outgoing Commissioners had played a pivotal role in shaping the future of policing in Kenya and had left an indelible mark. The president stated that officers seeking medical treatment will no longer be restricted to specific hospitals across the country. As part of the new changes, officers will now be able to access treatment at facilities of their choice under the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) program. “Under the expanded Universal Healthcare Coverage in the Taifa Care program, access to medical care will no longer be limited to certain identified hospitals,” Ruto announced. “Officers and service-

men and women will be able to access medical services and attention from all hospitals. We will improve access to different medical services,” he added. Further, the President announced the government will standardise the medical scheme of police officers to ensure that officers in the same job groups get services from the same medical facilities across the country.

# State to address youth bulge, aging population with new policy reforms

The State will seek to adjust population and development policies to address demographic shifts. This decision is driven by the evolving demographic landscape over the past 50 years, which has presented countries with both opportunities and challenges, according to Cabinet Secretary (CS) for the National Treasury and Economic Planning, John Mbadi. Mbadi noted that developed countries are experiencing population aging and shrinking working-age populations due to low fertility rates, while developing countries

are facing a youth bulge and rising unemployment resulting from rapid population growth. In a speech delivered on his behalf by Principal Secretary for Economic Planning, James Muhati, during the opening of the Kenya Population and Development Conference (KPDC) 2025 at the University of Nairobi, the CS emphasized that adjusting population and development policies is increasingly necessary to address these demographic shifts. He further stated that Kenya, like many other Sub-Saharan countries, continues to experience a relatively high population growth rate which has placed significant strains

on ecosystems and natural resources, social services, housing, and infrastructure, while contributing to unemployment and environmental pressures. Equally, the CS observed that the improvement in healthcare interventions demonstrate decline in maternal mortality ratio from the highs of 488 per 100,000 live births in 2008 to 355 per 100,000 live births in 2019, as well as reduction in under-five mortality rate from 90 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1989 to 41 deaths per 1,000 live births in 2022. The CS further acknowledged the reduction in teenage pregnancy from 20 per cent in 2008 to 15 per cent in 2022.

He emphasized health-care as one of the pillars of the government development blueprint captured in the Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) to ensure good health and wellbeing for Kenyans. Mbadi said the govern-

ment developed the Kenya Health Policy 2014-2030 that gives direction to ensure significant improvement in the overall status of health in Kenya in line with the Constitution of Kenya 2010, Vision 2030 and global commitments. The CS also pointed out that migration and urbanization continue to be of great concern and has implications on development planning both at national and county levels. This, he said, is mainly because most migrants are

young people aged 20-24 seeking jobs and education opportunities. But the ever-increasing numbers are unable to find decent employment to be able to financially support themselves as well as their families. "The outflow of skills remains a serious human resource problem but of greater concern is the need to safeguard the individual rights and to protect those migrating in search of jobs from exploitation and mistreatment," Mbadi said.

# Small-scale water providers ordered to register by April 28

All small-scale water service providers have been instructed to complete their registration by April 28th this year to ensure compliance with the Water Act 2016.

In a notice, the Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB) stated that the

directive targets various water providers, including community projects, gated community suppliers, individual and private operators, and water projects run by public benefit and non-governmental organizations.

Government regulations require all water providers, including small-scale operations

such as water kiosks, tankers, and private boreholes, to register with the water authority. Operating a water service without a license is illegal under the Water Act 2016.

Section 85(1) of the Water Act 2016 states that no person shall provide water services without a license issued by WASREB.

To comply with this

regulation, all water service system operators across all 47 counties must register their operations.


According to WASREB CEO Engineer Richard Cheruiyot, registration is key to maintaining high water service standards, covering quality, cost, and customer experience playing a crucial role in protecting consumer

health and safety and enabling the water authority to track water service access.


To facilitate registration, the process has been made accessible via the small-scale service providers (SSSPS) data collection link on its website. Water service operators are urged to complete their registration promptly to

mitigate the risk of incurring penalties.

The authority urged water system operators to comply with the directive and begin immediate registration upon which WASREB will maintain a register of all licensed water service providers, detailing their names, addresses, and the nature of their services.

# King’s visit fosters stronger Kenya-Netherlands bilateral ties

The tour is set to deepen Kenya-Netherlands collaborations across various sectors including trade, energy, agriculture and water

King Willem-Alexander and Queen Máxima of the Kingdom of the Netherlands (centre) on a farm in Naivasha.

The visit to Kenya by King Willem-Alexander and Queen Máxima of the Kingdom of the Netherlands from March 18 to 20, 2025, marked a key moment in strengthening over 60 years bilateral relations between the two countries.

The three-day tour is expected to deepen collaborations across key sectors, including trade, energy, water, climate change and agriculture.

Bilateral relations between Kenya and the Netherlands date back to early 1900s when the first Dutch nationals arrived in the country, establishing roots in Uasin Gishu County.

However, the two countries formally established relations in the 1970s, which have blossomed over the years.

Kenya and the Netherlands during the Royal Visit held a number of consultations aimed at evaluating bilateral relations and exploring new avenues for expanding cooperation.

The two sides discussed a number of issues including economic cooperation, climate change, institutional freedom and democracy, judicial reforms, peace and security and Kenya’s position on ongoing regional conflicts. They signed three Memoranda of Understanding and a Letter of Intent. The first MoU was on formation of a Joint Trade Committee (JTC) to foster bilateral trade between the two countries.

The JTC will address barriers, enhance market access and expand commercial ties. The two countries agreed to leverage the Kenya-EU Economic Partnership Agreement to support local exporters to access the EU market.

This will help to secure and diversify trade routes for Kenya’s goods, including flowers, tea, coffee and fresh produce, making the products more competitive globally.

There was also an agreement that outlines the Terms of Reference for an Agriculture Working Group aimed at enhancing agricul-

tural cooperation between the countries.

The third MoU seeks to foster tourism collaboration by encouraging more Dutch tourists to visit Kenya and more Dutch businessmen to invest in the sector.

A Dutch company, Invest Africa, signed the Letter of Intent to fund two water projects - Naivasha Special Economic Zone Water Supply and Sanitation Project and the Sabaki Bulk Water Supply Project - at a cost of €3 million (Sh423 million).

“The Netherlands global leadership in sustainable agriculture, water management and renewable energy aligns seamlessly with Kenya’s Vision 2030,” President William Ruto said. He added that the projects will enhance access to clean and reliable water, a key pillar for sustainable development and economic progress.

King Alexander lauded the cordial relationship between Kenya and the Netherlands.

“We attach great value to our cooperation with Kenya. This visit shows how our interests

are aligned and how close our ties have become,” he said. Political consultations held between Foreign Affairs teams from the two nations gave a clear pathway for cooperation on regional peace and security, climate change, multilateral engagement and strategic development partnerships.

The talks involved Prime Cabinet Secretary and Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Foreign and Diaspora Affairs Musalia Mudavadi and Caspar Veldkamp, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, together with their delegations.

Mr Mudavadi said the discussions reinforced Kenya’s dedication to democracy, good governance and the rule of law.

He observed that Kenya appreciates the Netherlands support in advancing judicial reforms, improving access to justice and bolstering institutional capacity.

“On regional peace and security, we emphasized the importance of diplomacy and dialogue over military intervention in resolving conflicts,” he said.

Adding, “Kenya remains actively engaged in mediation efforts in Sudan and the DRC, advocating for sustainable peace and development. As a steadfast partner in global stability, we are committed to working with the international community to address shared challenges.

Ties between Kenya and Netherlands have remained stronger over the years. Both countries have an ambassador stationed in each other’s capital.

Every year, the Netherlands contributes over €80 million (Sh9.9 billion) in development assistance to Kenya, supporting critical areas including water supply systems in arid and rural areas, health services, urban planning and infrastructure.

One of the sectors the Netherlands has invested in heavily in Kenya is water supply. The nation supports water catchment restoration in Kisumu to ensure that the area is preserved to sustainably supply water to the city and is able to withstand the threats of climate change.

In the energy sector, a consortium of companies including KP&P from the Netherlands developed the Lake Turkana Wind Power, the largest wind farm in Africa with 365 turbines generating 310MW.

The Government of the Netherlands invested 45 million Euros in Lake Turkana Wind Power, of which 35 million euros was invested via FMO (Dutch Development Bank).

The project idea originated from a Dutch farmer living in Kenya, who recognised the powerful wind resource and great potential investment opportunity during camping visits to the area, according to The Dutch Embassy in Nairobi.

The Netherlands is Kenya’s largest flower importer, with the country sending a billion stems of flowers every year for auction. The flowers, which land at the world’s largest auction in the Dutch capital, The Hague, are re-exported to the global markets.

Kenya also exports coffee, tea, fruits, vegetables, fish and tobacco to the Netherlands, while importing machinery, data processing equipment, chemicals and dairy products. ■

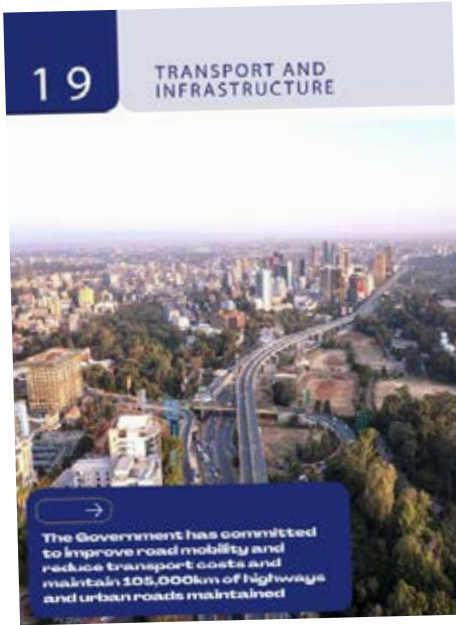

and sports tourism through the Magical Kenya campaign to attract both global and local tourists as well as boost local economies.

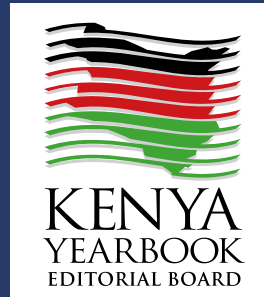

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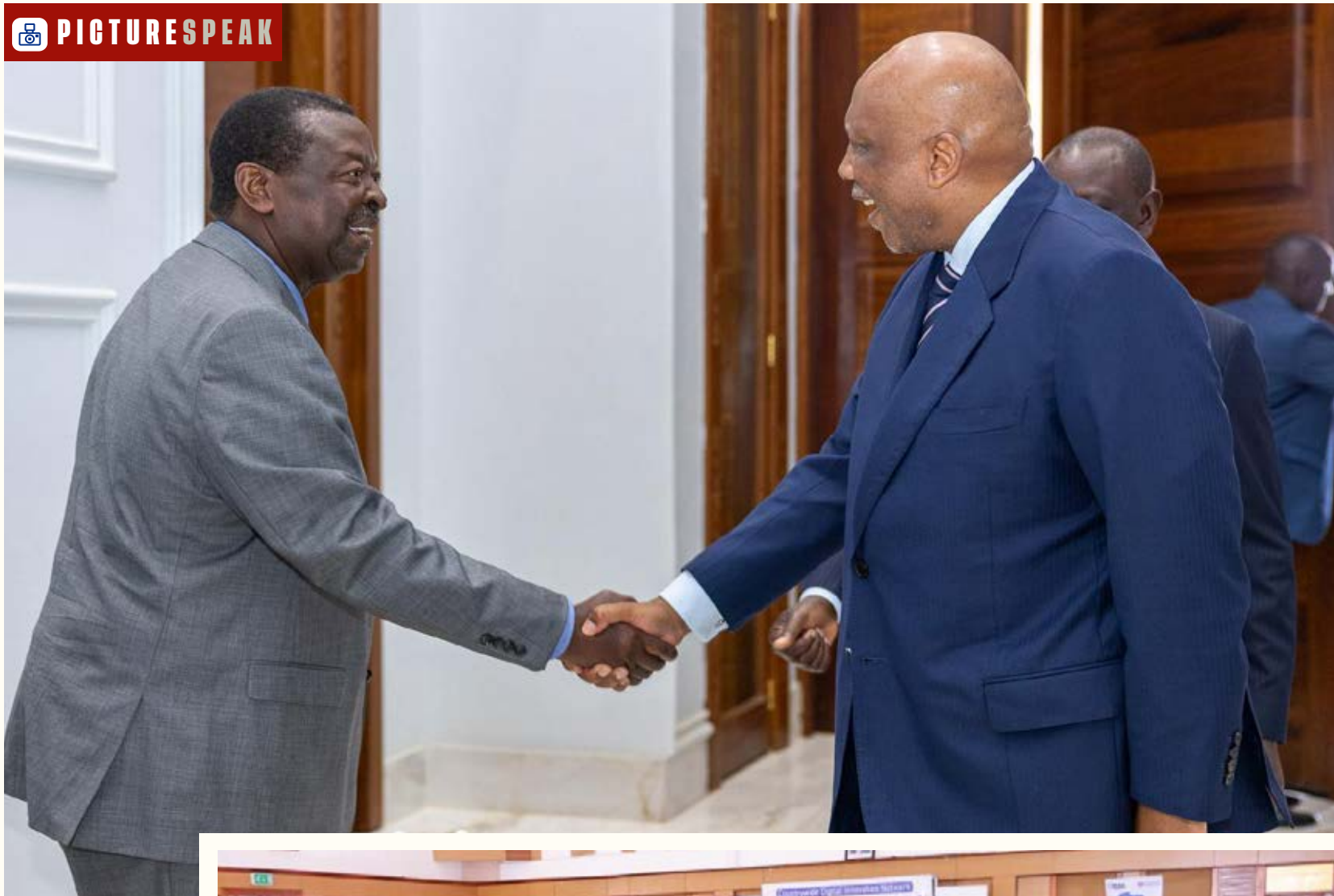

## KALRO introduces 7 new soya varieties to boost food security

The Kenya Agricultural Research Organization (KALRO) has introduced seven soybean varieties ahead of this rainy season in a bid to boost the country's food security.

The Director General, Dr. Eliud Kireger, said they have produced about 40 metric tons of seeds ready for sale to farmers and aim to increase the amount to over 400,000 metric tons, depending on farmer adoption.

Speaking during an agricultural expo held at KALRO in Kandara, Murang'a County, Dr. Kireger said the varieties can thrive in various climatic conditions across the country.

Additionally, he noted that soybean production will support the manufacture of animal feeds and cooking oil, both of which rely on soybean or sunflower as key raw materials. "Currently, the cost of animal feed is high because it is made from protein sources that are expensive. This will be a boost," he said.

Regarding cooking oil, Dr. Kireger stated that since soybean is a key ingredient in its production, increased soybean cultivation will help lower cooking oil

prices in the country.

"Last year, the government imported Sh117 billion worth of cooking oil. That is why we have pulled our efforts to soya beans and sunflower farming since they are among the main ingredients in the manufacture of cooking oil," Dr. Kireger said.

The DG at the same time they are working on having a proper soya seed management system through irrigation to ensure the availability of more certi-

fied seeds to farmers.

KARLO Chairman, Thuo Mathenge, revealed that the government is targeting 24 counties for an ambitious youth engagement program where 200,000 youth will be recruited and allocated idle government land to engage in farming activities, including soya bean cultivation.

Local leaders led by Gatanga MP, Edward Muriu, said the future of agriculture in Kenya looks promising, expressing optimism

that with the right inputs and support, food security will be assured.

"We welcome these new seed varieties in our county to address food shortages. One of the varieties, the drought-tolerant SB19 which matures within three months and can produce yields of 800 to 1,000 kilograms per acre, translating to about Sh180,000 per harvest will do well in this area," he explained.

Kiambu Deputy Governor, Rosemary Kirika echoed Muriu's sentiments and affirmed her commitment to introducing soya bean farming across Kiambu County. She noted that the county's favorable climatic conditions make it ideal for cultivating the crop. "Our farmers must look at agriculture not just as a subsistence activity but as a commercial venture that can bring wealth and improve livelihoods," she said.

Kirika emphasized that certified seeds, such as the newly introduced SB19 soya bean, offer consistent quality, higher yields, and resilience to drought factors that are crucial in adapting to climate change.

She urged farmers to plant early and take advantage of the anticipated long rains.

## New diaspora policy set to maximize Kenyan talent and investments abroad

The Government has launched the Diaspora Policy, 2024 to strengthen ties with the Kenyan diaspora and integrate them into the national development agenda.

Unveiled in Nairobi by Prime Cabinet Secretary and Cabinet Secretary for Foreign and Diaspora Affairs Musalia Mudavadi, the policy marks a transformative step in recognizing and harnessing the potential of Kenyans abroad.

The Kenya Diaspora Policy, 2024 serves as a strategic framework to engage, empower, and protect the

diaspora while fostering their contributions to Kenya's socio-economic progress.

Mudavadi emphasized

the need for structured platforms to facilitate active diaspora participation, noting that the updated policy builds on the Dias-

pورا Policy, 2014 while addressing emerging global dynamics.

"This Kenya Diaspora Policy, 2024 has been recalibrated and improved to respond to globalization shifts, emerging opportunities and threats, and the establishment of a dedicated State Department for Diaspora Affairs," Mudavadi said.

The policy outlines several core focus areas, including labor mobility, which facilitates employment opportunities for Kenyans abroad, and remittances and investment, which streamline financial remittances and encourage diaspora investments.

#### Government to jumpstart stalled SOIN - KORU dam

The Government will allocate funds to jumpstart the construction of the So-in-Koru Dam that stalled in September 2023.

Speaking during the National Government Development County Implementation Coordination and Management Committee meeting (NGD-CICMC), Kericho County Commissioner Gilbert Kitiyo confirmed that the government will allocate funds to continue the construction of the dam, and other stalled projects in Kericho County.

Mr Kitiyo further urged affected farmers in So-in-Koru Dam region to continue ploughing and tilling their land for food production until the government moves in and starts the project while assuring them that the government would compensate them for their land before relocation is done to pave way for the construction of the dam.

Speaking at the same forum, the liaison officer in charge of the dam Ms. Irine Chemutai explained the National Lands Commission has submitted a valuation report for Phase

II which requires Sh2.2 billion which she noted was yet to be deposited to NLC for disbursement to approximately 1,200 persons for the 478 parcels of land.

She however expressed concerns that owing to the time lapse, the parcels of land can be re-evaluated to reflect the current market value for land in the region.

She explained that the land requirement for the dam constructions including the treatment works is approximately 2,170 acres.

The compensation process was divided into two phases, where phase one involved 23 parcels of land for the embankment while phase two involved 455 parcels within the reservoir area.

Chemutai expounded the scope of the mega project saying it will cost the government a total of Sh19.9 billion to complete the construction by 27th August 2027.

The government has already made an advance payment of Sh499 million which is 2.5 per cent advance payment.

#### KRA's new trade hubs to drive regional trade growth

The launch of trade facilitation centers in Kariakoo, Lodwar, and Kakuma is expected to revolutionize trade between Kenya and South Sudan.

The Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) has established these three centers to enhance trade facilitation along the Northern Corridor, a critical trade route linking Kenya with South Sudan, Ethiopia, and Uganda.

This initiative also aims to improve compliance while creating business opportunities in Turkana County, ensuring that Kenya remains a hub for both international and regional trade.

Additionally, the facilities will help ease congestion at the Malaba and Busia border posts and significantly reduce transit times for cargo moving from Mombasa to South Sudan.

KRA Commissioner General Humphrey Wattanga, who launched the facilities, was accompanied by the Commissioner for Customs & Border Control (C&BC), Dr. Lilian

Nyawanda, and Turkana County Commissioner Julius Kavita.

Wattanga praised the new development as a game-changer for trade facilitation in the East African region. "The facilities are critical in the movement of goods within this region and are expected to enhance KRA's operations along the South Sudan link road. Establishing these centres will further expand KRA's footprint in the county, bringing the Authority's services closer to the people," he stated.

"Today, we celebrate a monumental achievement in both trade facilitation and border security. This project will ensure our borders are secure, our business environment remains conducive, and society at large is protected," Wattanga said.

The centres, which are also part of the LAPSET Corridor Program, are designed to support cargo monitoring along the corridor and facilitate exports and trade in Kenya.
